

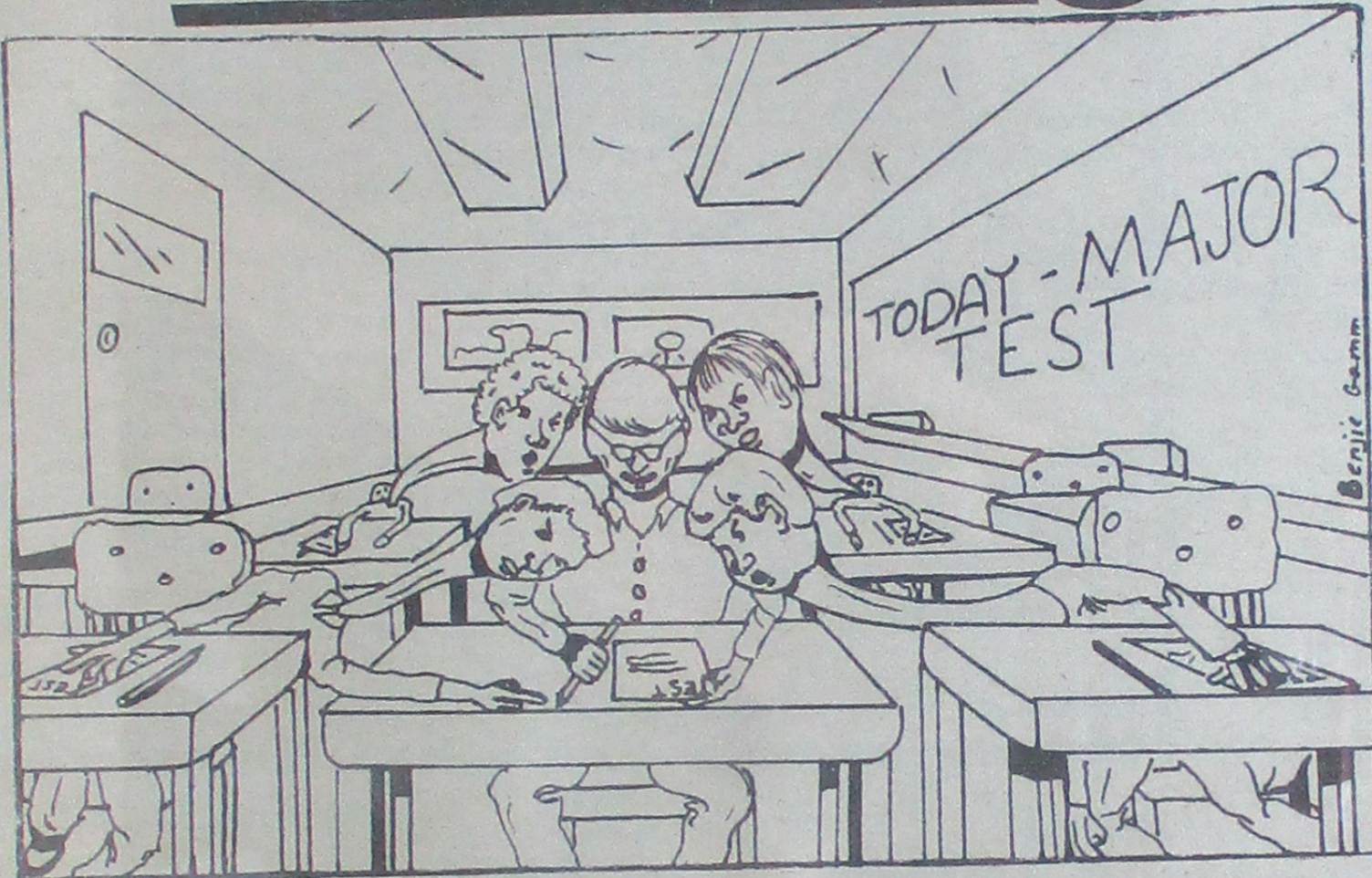

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS' OPINION ON CHEATING

When a high school newspaper in an Eastern city asked students about cheating, it got the answers listed (by percentage) below:

Question	Yes	No
Have you ever cheated in any way on schoolwork?	84	16
Do you feel cheating is wrong or unethical?	78	22
Do you allow others to cheat off your paper?	50	50
Do you use cheat sheets?	19	81
Do you copy off others' papers during tests?	26	74

Have you ever been caught cheating?	12	88
Would you turn in another student for cheating?	8	92
Do you feel guilty after having cheated?	43	57

The Institute for Social Research at the University of Michigan included questions on cheating and competition in a nationwide survey of high school seniors in 1978. How would classmates feel if a student cheated on a test? Most would not care, said 75.2 percent; 16.6 percent thought classmates would dislike it; and another 4.3 percent, that they would dislike it very much.

Among the same students, 29.1 percent said there was little or no competition for grades at their school; 34.6 percent thought there was some; 26.6 percent, quite a bit; and 9.6 percent, a great deal.

Have you ever cribbed on an exam? Sixty-two percent of high schoolers once told Gallup they had.

Dear Beth:

There is more cheating in schools than most people realize. As a student, I'm aware of how much actually goes on, and it is almost a way of life for most.

Students no longer will, or can, accept an academic challenge. Our educational system needs to devise a way to lessen the temptation.

Students tell me that the two main reasons they cheat are that marks seem so much more important to the school than learning is, and second, it's so easy to get away with it. Many teachers hardly notice, or do little about it if they do find out.

There needs to be a concerted effort on the part of parents, teachers and students to re-emphasize the value of learning, not just grades. It would also help if honor codes and rules were re-established, plus clearly stated and enforced punishments for failure to comply. It won't solve the problem, at least not soon, but it's worth working on a problem that goes on to undermine adult life as well.

CHANNEL 5 ON CHEATING

On Friday, October 5th, Channel 5 News (at 6:00) concluded their series on cheating with an examination of cheating in school. They began with the assumption that "schools are breeding grounds for cheaters" and then released the results of a poll of 1000 students they had just taken, showing that 1/3 of all of them have cheated, compared to the much lower 1/5 level of ten years ago.

According to the reporters on the show, most cheating was the result of peer pressure. Students interviewed stated that "you can't get by by being honest" and asked that "if a cheater does well, why not? Other students felt that cheating "deprived others of a fair chance to compete. In closing, the show asked, "Is honesty the best policy?" —a question that only you can answer.

The chart shows that most juniors cheat and don't feel guilty about it. What they do feel is that everyone else is doing it, so "why not?" Most people did say they would cheat in the future, but ironically most also said that honesty is the best policy, but we shall see whether or not the going gets tough enough to make them buckle under pressure.

CHEATING: SOPHOMORES

Most of the people interviewed in the Sophomore class said that their grades were in the B range, and all of them, male and female alike, admitted that they had cheated at least once since they've been in high school. When they were asked if they cheated now, 75% said "yes," and 25% said "no." Two-thirds of the people said that they would cheat in the future if they didn't study if they just didn't know the material. A small percentage of people have been caught cheating; they got zeroes for doing so. The students that do cheat now said that they would or have cheated in Algebra, English, Spanish, History, and Biology; apparently, these students have no preference, though more people admitted to cheating in Biology than in any other subject.

Most said that they would do nothing if they saw a classmate cheating, even if he/she were copying off the person being interviewed. Half of the students felt that teachers were aware of cheating; the remaining half thought that the teachers did not notice anything. 50% thought that someone cheating off you was equally as bad as you cheating off someone, 20% thought that you cheating off someone was worse, and 30% felt it was worse when someone else cheats off you. 75% thought that copying homework was cheating.

Two-thirds of the freshmen interviewed had cheated. The number of boys and girls cheating was equal. Only a few have cheated at the High School; most had cheated at the Jr. High. They cheated in all subjects, but science seemed to be their favorite.

Most don't cheat now, but they would consider cheating in the future. The most common reason they gave for cheating was pressure for good grades from their parents. They would cheat: "if I didn't know the answer" or "if I only knew one question out of 100" or "if it was a really big test that was of great importance to my overall grade." Only one would cheat only "if it was relatively unimportant."

The methods of cheating varied. Some would use crib notes or write something down on a desk or book cover. Others would look at someone else's paper. This could mean anything from "glancing at it to check my work" to "comparing answers" to actually "switching papers."

If they saw someone else cheating, they would probably do nothing, depending on who it was. One said, "If he wasn't getting caught and it was obvious, I'd do it too."

They agree that letting someone cheat off you is as bad as cheating off of someone else, but if they saw that someone was cheating off them, most of them would do nothing. Some said they would cover their paper only if it wasn't a friend.

They said that copying homework is not cheating unless you don't understand it or it's an opinion question. One agreed that it wasn't cheating but said, "I wouldn't do it often because it doesn't benefit you."

When asked what percentage of students they thought cheated in Sharon High, their answers ranged from 15% to "over 90%" with the most common answer being "about 50%." A few felt that the percentage in each grade is the same, but most said that the older students, especially the seniors, cheat more because they have more pressure to get good grades (because of college) and they are more familiar with the school.

On the subject of teachers noticing cheating, they seem to feel that teachers do notice it sometimes ("only if they are looking for it"), but they don't say anything about it.

Most of the freshmen had no idea what the school rule on cheating is. The rest of them knew it vaguely except for one who knew it exactly.

Finally, is honesty the best policy? The freshman answer to this was a very firm, resounding "sometimes."

"How do you go about cheating?" was the next question. Answers included: using crib notes, looking at someone's paper, and asking a neighbor for an answer. One individual stated that he liked writing the answers on his pencil. Students said that they cheated to avoid bad grades and because of parental pressure to do well. These sophomores estimated that 75% of freshmen cheated, and each grade had an increasingly higher cheating percentage than the class below it. This rise was explained by the fact that these people that typical freshmen were more afraid of getting caught than were others. As they get older, they are less concerned about getting caught. More pressure is put on doing well, and as a result, many become better at cheating. 75% of those interviewed claimed that they knew the policy on cheating which many said was a zero on a test.

Finally, students were asked if honesty is the best policy. Two-thirds responded "yes"; the remaining said it was not the best policy. They said that you must try to get ahead and sometimes you have to lie or cheat.

CHEATING: SENIORS

Of the seniors interviewed about cheating, 93% had cheated. Surprisingly enough, the percentage of male cheaters was 100% whereas the female percentage of cheaters was 86%. Most seniors cheat out of necessity, depending on the class, but the most popular subject to cheat in class was Foreign Languages (French had a 3 to 1 lead over Spanish) with science as a close second. One senior doesn't cheat in any class, except for Art.

The majority of seniors polled cheated because they were unsure of an answer or hadn't studied the night before. Most felt more obliged to cheat than not to cheat and get a bad grade. They especially expressed the pressure to get good grades because of the heavy competition of getting into a good college. One senior stated, "I cheat when I have to, not for any personal satisfaction."

Although 4/5 of the seniors polled thought the teachers noticed and 2/3 knew the punishment for getting caught, none of them had ever been caught and therefore felt no worries about cheating and getting caught.

As for what cheating entailed, 1/2 felt copying homework was cheating. 2/3 said that letting someone cheat off their paper was the same as cheating off another person. When asked how they would react to a person cheating off their paper, the majority said they would do nothing while 1/5 said they'd actually assist the person cheating; only 1/15 would cover their paper to prevent their paper being cheated off.

As far as methods of cheating go, the replies varied from crib notes to writing the answers on their shoes, desk or book cover. One senior professed wearing askirt on the day of the test and putting crib notes under her nylons. Then during the test, she'd pull up her skirt for the answers. The majority, however, didn't use such exotic cheating methods and relied on the person next to them for the answer.

After hearing long confession of cheating from 93% of the seniors interviewed, I presented the question: Is honesty the best policy? Surprisingly enough, 70% felt that indeed honesty was the best policy, while only 30% were undecided or felt it wasn't the best policy.

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Mr. Stevenson on Cheating

In conjunction with interviewing students on the subject of cheating, I asked Mr. Stevenson about his views on the matter.

Mr. Stevenson feels that the students are more aware of cheating than the administration is; therefore, he could not make an accurate guess of how many students cheat. He only knows of the students that were caught and reported to the office; and he does feel that the faculty is adequately reporting students caught cheating.

As far as the policy on cheating goes, Mr. Stevenson said that it's

about as effective as any other rule in society. He feels that the question "to cheat or not to cheat" reflects values a student has learned before entering the high school. In essence, he said that the ones cheating inside school are and will be the ones cheating outside school - and that they are only themselves. In conclusion, Mr. Stevenson stated that he believes everyone has at one time or another been tempted to cheat; it is how the individual handles these temptations that holds a tremendous bearing on his life.

CHEATING: TEACHERS

Did you ever wonder how teachers feel about cheating? Recently, members of our staff interviewed several teachers of different subjects and grades. The responses were varied and sometimes surprising.

When asked if they had ever cheated while in high school, half the teachers admitted that they had, while the other half denied ever having cheated. Of the ones who had cheated, only two were caught, and both called it a "humiliating experience" which changed their attitudes from then on. However, even those not caught cheating remembered feeling very guilty afterwards and regretting it.

Do teachers notice cheating? The teachers couldn't agree on how many students in Sharon High School cheat. One teacher suggested as high as 70%. The average guess was 60% of the students - 18% regularly and 42% occasionally. Most agreed that the number of students who cheat does not change through the grades or levels, but one teacher said that the number does increase with age, saying, "The 9th graders are more careless and seniors know how to do it."

The reasons they gave for students cheating were the same:

- 1) Pressure on student by parents, friends, and themselves to do well in school. As one teacher put it, "(In) Sharon particularly, getting into a good college is a status symbol."
- 2) Laziness - teachers think many students have the attitude, "Why study if you can cheat?", and don't see anything wrong in cheating; "that's the way the game is played."
- 3) For the sheer challenge of pulling it off on the teacher. However, teachers think few cheat for this reason because "the risk is too high and the reward too small."

What do teachers do if they catch a student cheating? Only half know the official school policy, but most agreed that cheating would assure an automatic zero on the paper followed by a seating change, and/or a slip to the office and finally a talk with the parents, if repeated. Most teachers considered copying homework cheating and would punish both parties. However, they were divided about equally when asked if someone being cheated off of during a test should be punished as much as the one actively cheating. Some said they would punish the person being cheated off of less or not at all, simply because it was hard to prove if it was done knowingly. Overall, there was a large range from "very liberal" to "strict to the letter" concerning the enforcing of the rules in general.



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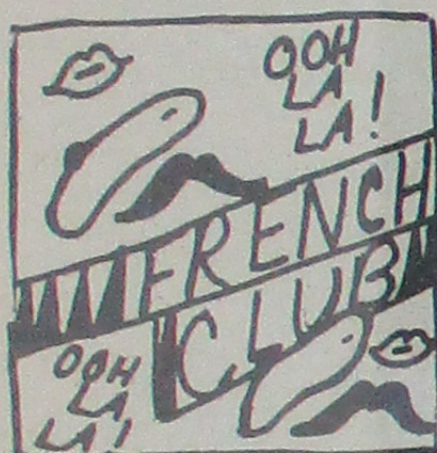

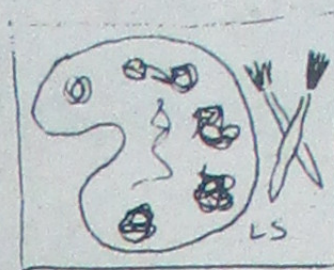
THE 1981 YEARBOOK

FOOTBALL

On Saturday October 18, in a drizzling rain, the Sharon High School Varsity Football Team captured its first Hockomock victory of the year at Stoughton, 34-14. The Eagles scored first with a Jeff Cosgrove to Dave Neilson pass. With less than one minute in the half Ron Baskerville scored on a one yard plunge. On the issuing kickoff, Stoughton fumbled, and Dave Neilson came up with the ball in Black Knight territory. Cosgrove took over and hit Neilson with a 9 yard touchdown pass. Sharon went to the lockerroom with a comfortable 20-0 lead. In the third quarter, Stoughton put together a scoring drive in which Carlos Silva raced in from the two-yard line. Silva ran the two point conversion. In the fourth quarter, the Eagles put together a 92 yard drive. Baskerville capped the drive with a three yard run. Badoian, four for five on the day, kicked the extra point. Baskerville scored one more touchdown on a two yard drive. Stoughton ended the scoring with a 13 yard pass from McCarthy to Pires.

In the Oct. 26 game on a blusterly Sunday, postponed from Saturday, King Philip struck first on a long pass after recovering a Sharon fumble in the first quarter. On Saturday November 1st Sharon brought their two game winning streak into Franklin, and extended it to three straight, 21-14. The only points scored in the first half came on a 15 yard pass from Jeff Cosgrove to Mike Blau. The kick was no good, and at halftime the score was Sharon 6 Franklin 0. In the second half Sharon scored on a Baskerville one yard run. He also ran the two point conversion to make the score 14-0. The final Eagle drive was capped off by a Baskerville 6 yard run. Peter Badoian kick split the uprights. In the 4th quarter Franklin struck twice to create the final score. The Eagles had fine offensive performances from quarterback Jeff Cosgrove and tailback Ron Baskerville. On defense Mike Blau had a good day. Peter Badoian and Rich Hertzberg both made key plays.

Powerful Canton put 18 points on the board in the second half before Sharon could strike one last time on a Jim Cuneo run and a Ron Baskerville two point conversion, creating the final score. ORDINARY PEOPLE (****) Rated R

I cannot remember the last time I enjoyed a movie so immensely, became totally immersed in a film, and for two hours completely forgot the outside world. Ordinary People is the portrait of an upper-middle class family, who will not admit that they have problems.

Ordinary People begins in the aftermath of a tragedy: six months earlier, Buck, the oldest son died in a boating accident. Conrad (Timothy Hutton) survives the accident. Unable to deal with his guilt Conrad attempts suicide. As the film opens Conrad, released from a mental hospital, is attempting to get back into the swing of things: school, glee club, swim team, and girls. But things are not going as planned: Conrad is still gripped by despair and depression.

To deal with his problems Conrad begins to see psychiatrist (Judd Hirsh). Through these sessions Conrad realizes the roots of his pain: that he does not always have to be in "control", that he does not have to blame himself for his brother's death, and that he can be loved.

Calvin, (Donald Sutherland) Conrad's father is also deeply troubled. All these years he has been going to work, the country club, and his home, never analyzing his relationships with his wife, children, and friends. Calvin is not sure if all this work and energy was worth it.

Mary Tyler Moore does a superb job playing the cold and often bitchy Beth Jarrett. But towards the end of the film I began to pity her. In a way, Beth, was worse off than Conrad. Beth was always the "perfect" woman: always there when the kids came home from school, a good housekeeper, and a good wife. But she also never wanted to admit problems or emotions concerning the family. Because of this, Beth has closed herself off from the rest of the world.

Ordinary People is an engrossing film. It is about appearances, and the self-destructive lengths people will go to maintain them. And it also shows that this image frequently cannot be maintained without destroying the family.

THE KINKS IN CONCERT WITH ROBIN LANE AND THE CHART-BUSTERS, OCT 18, PROVIDENCE CIVIC CENTER.

After a very generous and well-received set by Robin Lane, which lasted almost an hour, the house lights were dimmed and the sold out crowd at the Providence Civic Center went absolutely wild. The Kinks took their time in beginning the show. After a slow instrumental version of "You Really Got Me," the legendary Kinks set the pace for the evening with the rocking "Hardway." When the Kinks left the stage, the audience began the usual clapping, whistling, and foot stomping. They returned and did "Pressure," "Attitude," and the ancient "Twist and Shout." Then a strange thing occurred: after they left the stage the house lights were turned on. The audience didn't like this one bit. They acknowledged it with loud boos and angry screams. Just then the lights were turned off again. Once again the Kinks returned to do a new song entitled "Give the People What They Want," which is going to be on their new album soon to be released. As usual the final song was "David Watts"

Before "All Day and All of the Night," Ray Davies said, "Rock bands will come and rock bands will go, but rock and roll is going to go on forever." After this concert, I think this is one rock band that is far from going.

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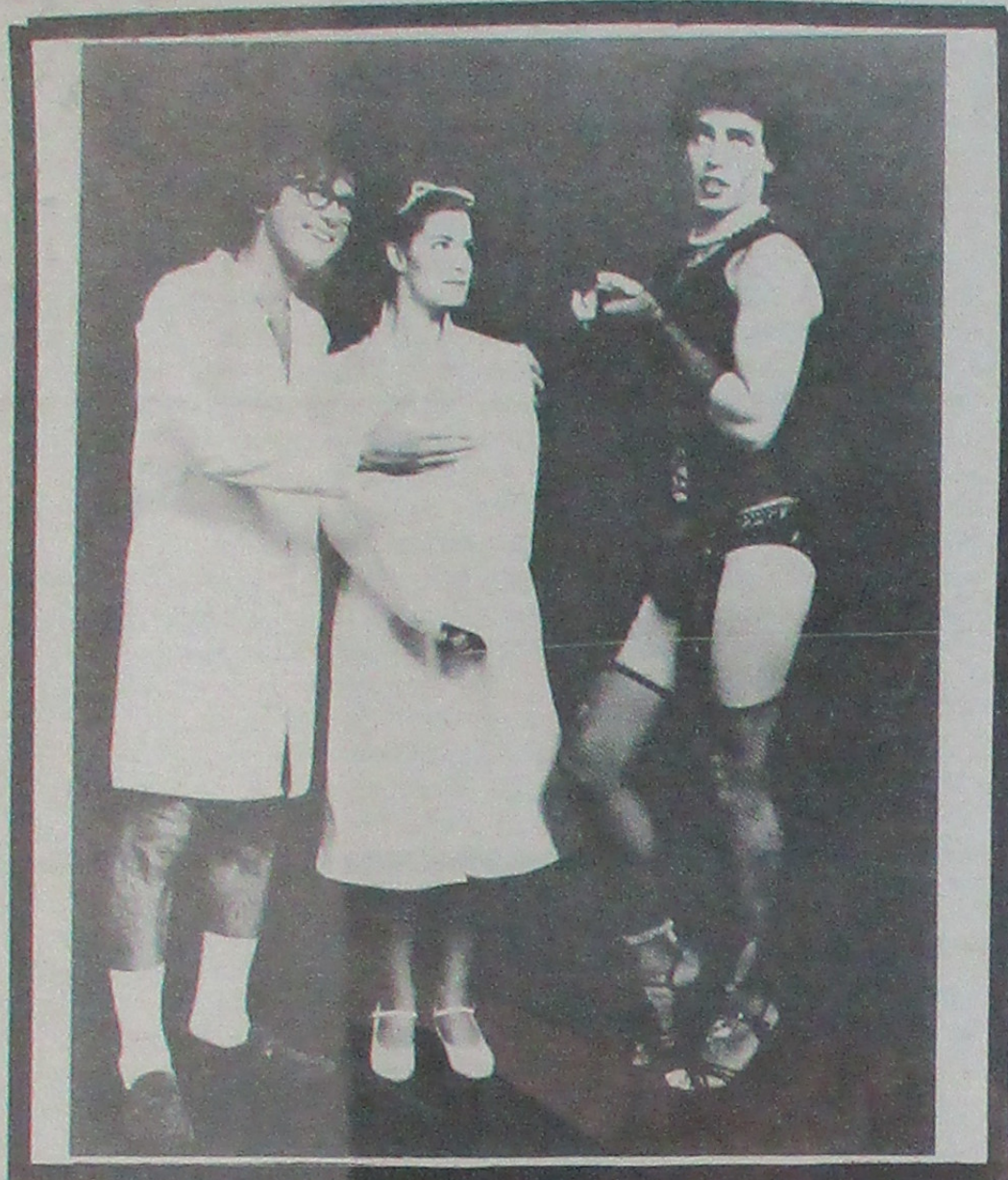
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THE ROCKY HORROR SHOW (****)

If you have not yet heard of The Rocky Horror Show, the American stage version which recently premiered at the Harvard Square Theater and is now touring the U.S. at theaters throughout the country, someone should let you out of your cage. For the last part of the past decade, the movie version of this musical has been playing around the country to the accolades of thousands of Rocky aficionados, with the main attraction being interaction of the film's audience with the actors on the screen. Unfortunately, at the film version, although it is great fun to listen to the cracks of those who know the movie well and to watch people in the audience get bombarded with rolls of flying toilet tissue, often it is impossible for one not acquainted with the movie's storyline to discern exactly what is going on, especially when someone is screaming "Where's your ----'n neck" directly into his ear. That is why it is such a thrill to see the play, where there are only a few minor, albeit humorous, interruptions.

For those ancients ignorant of Rocky's plot, a synopsis goes something like this: It is a cold, dark, gloomy night and rain is pouring heavily. Brad and Janet, two wimps who have just become engaged following the wedding of one of their friends, are driving down a deserted roadway when they run out of gas (convenient, huh?). In order to telephone for help, they journey to the castle of one Dr. Frank 'n Furter (yes, that's his real name), androgynous spaceman from Transylvania who is attempting to create the world's first synthetic male hunk (Rocky). In the castle, the two neophytes perchance meet up with a number of perverted persons; the most important of whom are the following: Riff Raff, Frankie's hunch-backed assistant, who makes incestuous love with his sister; Magenta, Riff Raff's sibling in love, who also makes bisexual love with one of Frankie's groupies; Columbia, one of Frankie's sexual outlets, who also makes bisexual love with Magenta; and Rocky himself, another of the good doctor's sexual pawns, who also makes love with Janet. Needless to say, the Brady Bunch these individuals are not. They are, however, a talented little clan who, with the help of writer Richard O'Brien's witty lines and catchy rock tunes,

manage to make for one enjoyable evening, as, for the remainder of the film, Brad and Janet endure the erotically perverted antics of the good Dr. Frank 'n Furter.

The production this writer was fortunate enough to see boasts and especially talented cast. For those who have seen the movie, these performers are better singers and dancers than the actors who appeared in the film. Rocky is played by one of the country's leading baton twirlers and exhibits this talent of his during one of the musical's better production numbers, the "Time Warp". Brad and Janet sing better than did Barry Bostwick and Susan Sarandon in the film version, Brad being especially effective when rendering the only song from the play not contained in the movie, "Once in a While", and also make a better match than did the film actors. Most importantly, Frank Gregory, the man who portrays Dr. Frank 'n Furter and the one on whom the production stands or falls, although perhaps not as captivating as Tim Curry in the movie, is feminine enough and talented enough to pull off playing the hermaphroditic scientist with relative ease, seeming to enjoy wearing his sleek, black leotard and other female apparel, so that when he is on the stage, he is king, controlling the cast as well as the audience with every swivel of his posterior, dominating the stage as well as the room with every word from his mouth.

Gregory and the rest of the company are so talented and the production is so enjoyable, in fact, that this writer wouldn't mind shelling out another \$14.50 to see The Rocky Horror Show again. Recommended is this production (if it ever returns to Boston) to anyone who wishes to have a lot of fun for two full hours and doesn't mind seeing a play which lacks a deep message, since the play doesn't have one. Still, if one is willing to just sit back, relax, and let this wonderful troupe of sexual deviants fulfill his wildest dreams (believe me, no one's dreams can be any wilder than the erotica in this play), I guarantee he will have an evening he will never forget.

This opening episode was directed by Carol O'Connor. It was an episode that was so true to life it sent a chill down your spine. I like the transition from comedy to drama, but I wonder if in the new situation the show will survive. Now, it's only Archie, Stephanie and Archie's co-workers to help the two get through the sad times. But still Archie can dwell on the good times he had with Edith, Mike, and Gloria. BLACK SABBATH: HEAVEN AND HELL (***)

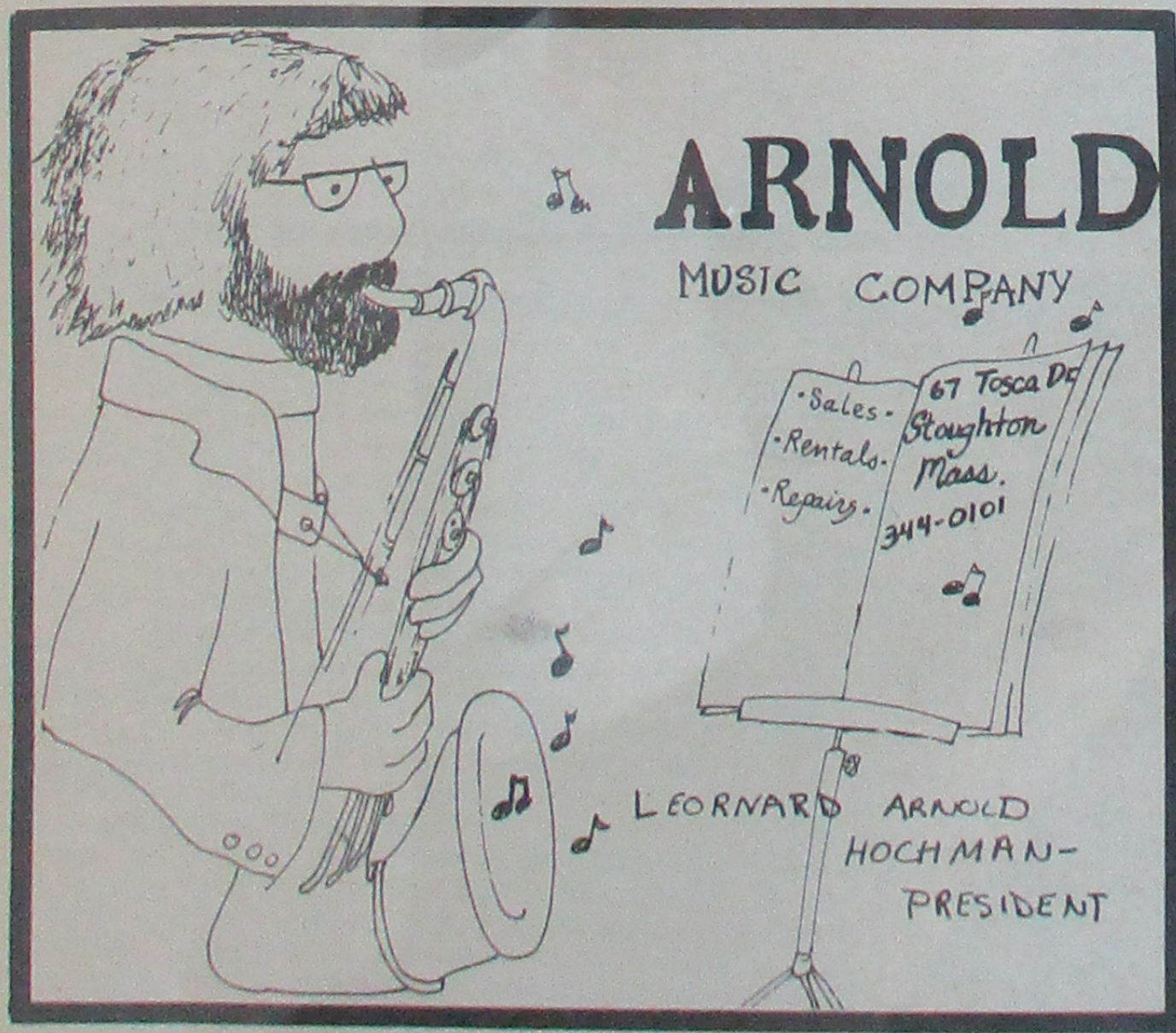
Many people believed that the recent absence of lead screamer Ozzie Osbourne would bring Black Sabbath to it's grave--not so. Sabbath has come up with Ronnie James Dio, former lead vocalist of Ritchie Blackmore's Rainbow. His deep haunting voice is definitely tailor-made for Black Sabbath, and has more vitality than Osbornes.

The album contains eight excellent cuts, with three standouts. The first, and hardest rocking song on the album is "Neon Knights." Next is the mysterious "Children of the Sea," one of the slower songs on the album. Queen's top ten hit "Play the Game" starts the album off on the right foot. "Crazy Little Thing Called Love" portrays Queen as a 50's Elvis-styled group. "Another One Bites The Dust" is a heavy metal funk combination that has reached a well-deserved number one rating. Queen shows off their vocal talent with "Save Me", "Need Your Loving Tonight", and "Sail Away Sweet Sister". "Don't Try Suicide" styles Queen as a street-corner soul group. In response to "Sound Off: Conscription - Do We Need It?" I would like to make the following comments. My purpose in this response is to properly educate your readers about the all volunteer Army.

First, let me address the lottery system of selection. Agreed, women should be included in the lottery. The total number of women has increased from 39,000 in 1969 to over 150,000 in 1979 in our armed forces, which translates to over 8% of the total force. Furthermore, Congress has mandated the following constraints. (1) women are not permitted to fill direct combat roles and (2) the need to reserve a substantial number of non-combat positions for men in order to provide a pool of ready replacements for close combat positions. However, women can be used in large numbers in the peacetime and wartime force.

Second, I will comment on the quality of our armed forces personnel. You will find no argument here that our army has personnel problems. The quality of our army is only as good as the people who enlist into it. But let me illustrate the importance of recruiting quality personnel. The XM1, the new tank for the U.S. Army, costs 1.5 million dollars each and weighs 59.8 tons. All the money, technology and sophistication invested into the XM1's development will render it ineffective without quality (not quantity) personnel trained to operate it. What will make XM1 effective is well educated and highly trained soldiers. Quality personnel must come from our high school graduates. Not graduates from some other town, but graduates from every town. You stated in the article "The idea of a country being able to survive with an all-volunteer armed forces is a wonderful one, but it is simply not working." It is just not my responsibility to keep the all-voluntary force viable, it is a joint responsibility. Furthermore, you stated "We have become a country of whiners and complainers, and we have forgotten that we live in the greatest country on earth." How true! However, in order to sustain our greatness, it will take your efforts, my efforts, and every other Americans efforts combined.

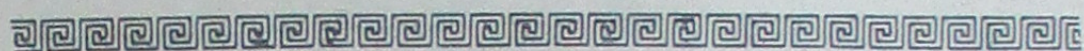

As more stress is placed on getting good grades in a subject than actually learning and understanding the material, the student is placed under a greater amount of pressure and is more prone to cheat
