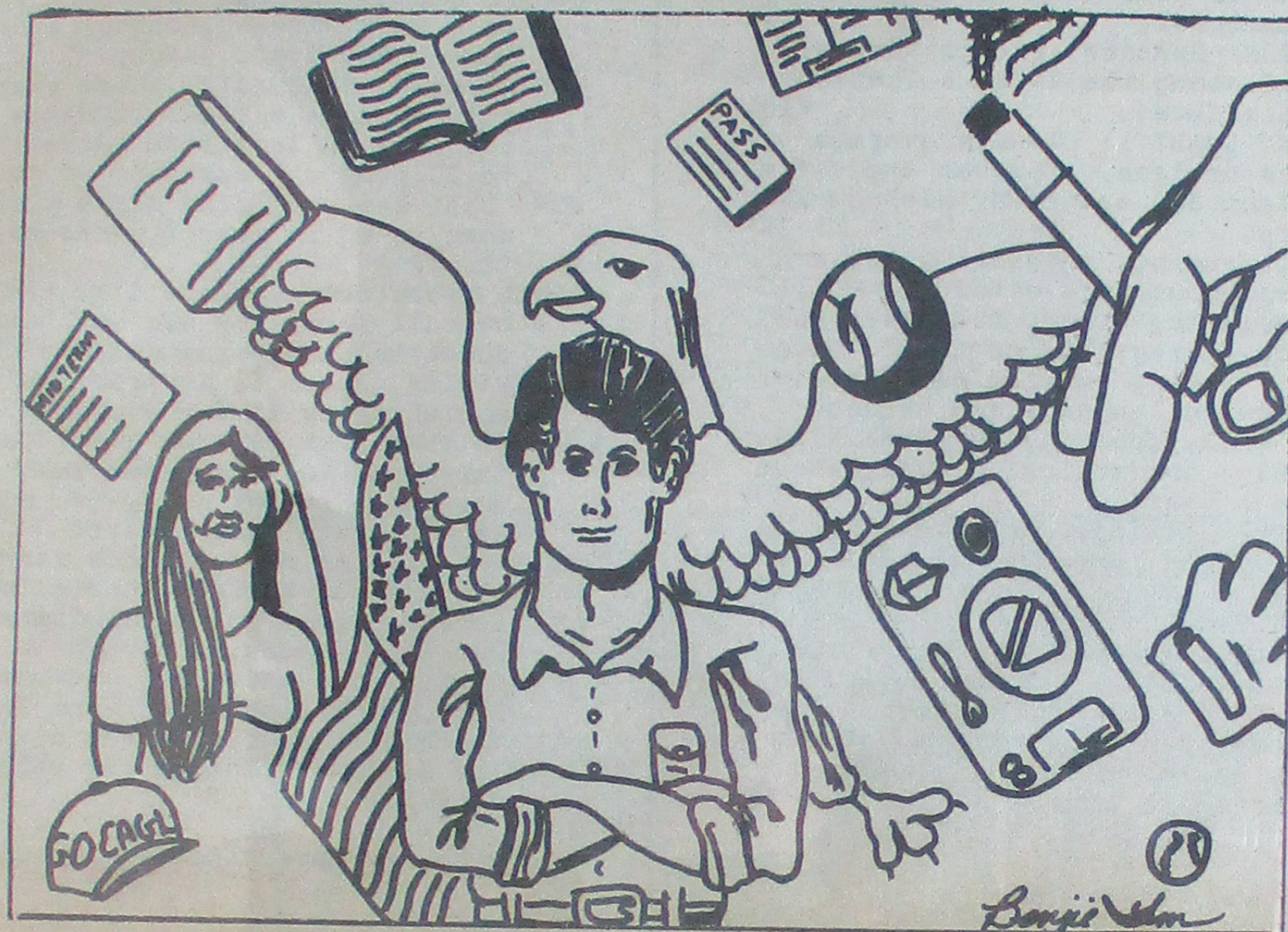

### SHARON HIGH SCHOOL

Enrollment: 950  
Grades 9 - 12

### MAKING THE GRADE

	RATE
<b>SCHOOL SPIRIT</b> Sharon is very enthusiastic about their basketball team. Spirit Days are held, and Spirit Caps were sold.	(7)
<b>GUIDANCE</b> The ratio is about 250:1 and career guidance courses are given.	(9)
<b>COURSE SELECTION</b> Vocational arts are poor, but academic courses are great--many advanced courses (3 sciences and computers)	(7)
<b>COURSE SIZE AND QUALITY</b> There is a 25 student limit and most teachers are adequate or better.	(8)
<b>GYM</b> Classes are enormous, and instruction and skills are down played. Not co-ed.	(2)
<b>LUNCH</b> Lunches aren't bad. There are 3 choices, including a popular salad bar.	(7)
<b>ACTIVITIES</b> There is an enormous selection, and most are very active.	(8)
<b>SCHOOL NEWSPAPER</b> The newspaper's content is good and the paper is widely read.	(8)
<b>SPORTS</b> The school lacks hockey and swimming but has all other regular sports on varied levels.	(8)
<b>RULES</b> Rules are excessively harsh. There are police and monitors, no last-period study dismissal, and an 85% attendance rule.	(2)

Canton. Franklin. Mansfield. Newton North. North Attleboro. Norton. Norwood. Stoughton. Eight area high schools are the subject of one of the Sharon High Times' most challenging and exciting features ever. Almost twenty staff members of the newspaper altruistically sacrificed a day at Sharon High School to report what "a day in the life of another high school" is like. Following are the results of day-long visits to these neighboring secondary institutions.

It should be noted that each item on each school's report card is graded on a scale of 1 (worst) - 10 (best). For the subject of "rules" it was decided that a "10" would be "most liberal" (like open campus, smoking area, no 85% rule, etc.) and a "1" would be "most strict" (i.e. no last-period study dismissal, no leisure area outside, etc.). The grading in all the other categories is based on what the obvious "best" state would be; inevitably, the grades are strongly influenced by the writers' opinions and impressions, and are in no way meant to represent a definitive assessment of that particular school.

Here, then, are the ratings of Sharon High School's peers--as well as an objective(?) report card for Sharon High School itself!

## NEWTON NORTH HIGH SCHOOL

Enrollment: 2900  
Grades 10-12

	RATE
SCHOOL SPIRIT "Transition" is the school store where coats, scarves, hats and T-shirts--in school colors--are sold. Spirit is high. (7)	
GUIDANCE Students find guidance department very helpful. (6)	
COURSE SELECTION Spanish, French, Latin, Russian are among the large selection of courses offered. (10)	
COURSE SIZE AND QUALITY Classes average 26 students or less. Courses are varied and excellent and taught by high-quality instructors. (8)	
GYM Swimming, dancing, physical games and all regular sports are offered. (10)	
LUNCH Salad bar, ice cream, fruit are sold in addition to regular lunches. Large cafeteria. Eating outside permitted (9)	
ACTIVITIES Foreign language and student clubs for math, debating, speech; films shown weekly; one musical a year; about four plays a year. (9)	
SCHOOL NEWSPAPER Articles in foreign language, sports, theatre, special interests. (9)	
SPORTS Too varied to list. (10)	
RULES Detention if caught smoking, but usually overlooked. Suspension for fights. No monitors. Open campus. Student government has a voice. Rules are fairly loose. Students smoke pot and cigarettes in lavs. (9)

## CANTON HIGH SCHOOL

Enrollment: 1350  
Grades 9-12

	RATE
SCHOOL SPIRIT Students are especially proud of the football and the math team. Most could only name a few schools they thought better than their own. (8)	
GUIDANCE There is 1 counselor for every 270 students. (7)	
COURSE SELECTION Most students feel there is a very wide selection, such as German and Oceanography. (9)	
COURSE SIZE AND QUALITY There seems to be a good rapport between students and teachers. Class size varies between 7 to 25 pupils, depending on course. (9)	
GYM Most students like gym but wish it were more co-ed in practice instead of in theory. (6)	
LUNCH Very few students like the lunch overall, but many are enthusiastic about the newly installed salad bar. (6)	
ACTIVITIES There is a varied selection--a club activity for everyone. (7)	
SCHOOL NEWSPAPER Canton has a very professional looking paper that deals with more than school news, but not many students are aware of it. (8)	
SPORTS All the students are very enthusiastic about their football, hockey and soccer teams, but disappointed in their basketball team. (9)	
RULES With the exception of a new rule limiting absences per term in addition to the 85% rule, and the no-hats rule, the students thought the rules were very fair. (9)

## NORTH ATTLEBORO HIGH SCHOOL

Enrollment: 1200  
Grades 9-12

	RATE
SCHOOL SPIRIT Overall school spirit was extremely high. There seemed to be something for everyone to enjoy. Very unified. (8)	
GUIDANCE Ratio is 1 counselor to 300 students. Special room for guidance materials. (Career center). (7)	
COURSE SELECTION Something for everyone, especially electives: woodshop, pottery, graphic arts, photography, auto shop, etc. Good academic selection also. (8)	
COURSE SIZE AND QUALITY 25 student class limit; good quality. (7)	
GYM Classes are based on one activity--leaning proper technique--participation excellent. (9)	
LUNCH Cafeteria is spacious and comfortable. Food is average, selection is good, and desserts such as icecream bars and sandwiches are available. (7)	
ACTIVITIES Again a great many to choose from. (8)	
SCHOOL NEWSPAPER No real newspaper, just a bulletin. (3)	
SPORTS Sports are same as Sharon, with a lot of team spirit, especially in football and track. (9)	
RULES seem very fair. Very different from Sharon--more liberal, yet more effective. Passes are needed, smoking area available, dismissal from last study and late arrival permissible in senior year. Open studies except for freshmen. (9)

## FRANKLIN HIGH SCHOOL

Enrollment: 1550  
Grades 9-12

	RATE
SCHOOL SPIRIT The overall atmosphere for learning seems good; most kids seem to enjoy school. (7)	
GUIDANCE There is a large resource as well as computer tie-ins for career planning. (9)	
COURSE SELECTION They have a wide variety of courses, especially in Practical Arts. There are AP courses in all major fields. (10)	
*COURSE SIZE AND QUALITY The course size 25-30 seems slightly big for individual help. (8)	
GYM The importance of sports is stressed. There is a wide variety. (9)	
LUNCH It was not bad, but could not compare to Mom's. The presence of a salad bar and a snack bar add to it. (7)	
ACTIVITIES They have almost every imaginable activity. (8)	
SCHOOL NEWSPAPER Its irregular publication is a major drawback. (4)	
SPORTS They include football, cross-country (B & G) field hockey, soccer (B&G), basketball, wrestling, skiing, track, hockey, baseball, softball, golf, tennis, track. (9)	
RULES They are strictly enforced. No one is allowed in hall without a pass. In-house suspension students stay in room whole day (lunch brought to them). (3)

## NORWOOD HIGH SCHOOL

Enrollment: 1394  
Grades 10-12

### RATE

- SCHOOL SPIRIT Because of the somewhat lenient rules and the first-place marching band and football team, Norwood High has a lot of spirit. (9)
- GUIDANCE There is a ratio of 260 students to 1 counselor, but part of the guidance program includes a Mass. Occupation Information System computer to help the students create a self-profile. (8)
- COURSE SELECTION Norwood has more extensive art programs and AP course selections and has a vocational school, The Peabody, as an alternative to regular high school. (9)
- COURSE SIZE AND QUALITY The students feel the classes are adequate, but the average class size is about 25 students. (6)
- GYM The boys and girls have separate gyms. Dress codes and attendance do not seem to be too well enforced. (6)
- LUNCH Norwood offers one lunch, a salad bar, and an ice cream bar. Their candy store is open during first four periods and breakfast is available for the seniors in the open caf study during that time. Lunch is one period of the 8 period day. (7)
- ACTIVITIES Norwood offers a wider range of activities which are incorporated into the school day once a month. (9)
- SCHOOL NEWSPAPER The Newspaper Club lacks continuous student involvement; they hope to print their first paper for the year in February. (2)
- SPORTS Norwood has an extensive sports program and are proud of their top-ranked teams. (10)
- RULES Tardiness to class is not strongly dissuaded. Students have the use of a smoking area during lunch and between classes. (8)

## STOUGHTON HIGH SCHOOL

Enrollment: 1440  
Grades 9-12

### RATE

- SCHOOL SPIRIT There is not much school spirit. Nobody, including teachers, really cares. (4)
- GUIDANCE Students find guidance department very helpful. (9)
- COURSE SELECTION There are many different courses offered and there are four ability levels available--basic, standard, college, honors. (8)
- COURSE SIZE AND QUALITY Class sizes are reasonable. (7)
- GYM Many choices are available each term. (8)
- LUNCH There are three different menus offered. (8)
- ACTIVITIES Activities are available but only a few participate. (4)
- SCHOOL NEWSPAPER Quality varies. (5)
- SPORTS More people are involved in sports than in the past, but most have no interest. (4)
- RULES The rules are not extremely strict with the exception of dismissals. (6)

## MANSFIELD HIGH SCHOOL

Enrollment: 1000+  
Grades 9 - 12

### RATE

- SCHOOL SPIRIT Too many students, as well as teachers, have a poor attitude towards learning. Spirit toward sports is good. Respect for administration is very good. (6)
- GUIDANCE There are only three guidance counselors with ratios 400:1, 400:1, 200:1. (6)
- COURSE SELECTION There is a good selection of vocational courses. An effort is being made to improve the academic courses. Last year three advanced placement courses were added although there are only a few students in each. (8)
- COURSE SIZE AND QUALITY There are minimal "great" teachers. Mansfield High is strong, however, in physics and advanced math departments. (7)
- GYM There are structured classes with good facilities. (8)
- LUNCH Two choices and a snack bar are offered. (7)
- ACTIVITIES There are quite a few clubs including a National Honor Society. (7)
- SCHOOL NEWSPAPER It comes out periodically. (6)
- SPORTS There are no soccer, hockey or gymnastic teams. Football gets the most attention. (6)
- RULES Seniors and students in the High Honor Society are allowed to leave during last period studies. There are no monitors. The rules are enforced by the principal and vice-principal who constantly cruise the halls. (9)

The opportunity to learn is available at Mansfield High; however, the students' attitude seems to get in the way.

## NORTON HIGH SCHOOL

Enrollment: 700  
Grades -- 9 - 12

### RATE

- SCHOOL SPIRIT is middle of the road. (5)
- GUIDANCE has three counselors per 700. (9)
- COURSE SELECTION is very good. Class size averages 20 students. (10)
- COURSE SIZE AND QUALITY are good. The quality is evident if the kids want it. (9)
- GYM is not so good according to many. A lot of favoritism is shown to jocks. (5)
- LUNCH is rated as poor. Everyone I talked to said it wasn't worth eating. (3)
- ACTIVITIES are very diversified. (8)
- SCHOOL NEWSPAPER Nobody even knew about it, but it does exist. (2)
- SPORTS are very good in this school. They have a wide choice. They are champs in baseball. (9)
- RULES are very fair with few exceptions. One exception is the 10/20 rule dealing with attendance. (9)

Are all public schools the same? Is the school your friend goes to in Sharon the same as Canton High School except that we have a better football team?

There are many similarities between Sharon High and CHS. Both are public high schools with middle-class students, both offer standard courses: general, business, and college-prep curriculum.

But, the students at CHS have more freedom and more privileges than students at SHS. At Sharon High, there are monitors in the halls during and between classes to check students for passes, and check kids smoking in the bathrooms; there are policemen patrolling the campus grounds morning and afternoon and in-house suspension if you're caught smoking. If you have in-house suspension, you must stay in one room, sit there, and do your class assignments for the whole school day....

One program that Sharon High has that Canton doesn't is the Metco program. This program busses inner-city students into Sharon High for the day. There are 32 Metco students in Sharon High now; they have been attending Sharon Public School since fifth grade. These students said that they have no problems at Sharon High because they are black; they said that all the racial problems between themselves and the white students were worked out when they were younger. Now, they are an accepted, vital part of the Sharon High community....

Seniors do have a right to feel that they have no freedom because they've seen the school go from an open, liberal place to a strict school with tough rules.

Many SHS students have a negative attitude toward their school because of this reason. One student said that going to school at SHS was like being "Being behind bars" all day.

Other students like SHS, and feel that if you live within the limits of the rules, and don't start

any trouble, you can have a meaningful, productive four years at Sharon High.....

Though Sharon High does have strict rules in comparison to CHS, it is apparent that if you live within the rules of the school, you can receive a good, strong education at Sharon High School.

## 9 KEY ISSUES

The student body of Sharon High School has long viewed many of the rules imposed upon it as harsh. Now we have a chance to compare specific rules, as well as institutions, in relation to the following schools: Canton, Franklin, Mansfield, Newton North, North Attleboro, Norton, Norwood, and Stoughton.

Monitors - 2 schools (Sharon, Stoughton) each have two paid monitors. 7 schools have no official monitors, most of them having teachers acting in that role instead.

Early Dismissal For Seniors - All 9 schools have dismissal for seniors in mid-May

\* Metco Program - 1 school (Sharon) has it  
7 schools do not

\* Crime in School - 3 schools (Sharon, Stoughton, Norwood) cited theft from lockers to the burning of posters. 5 schools reported a minimal amount of crime.

\* "85% Attendance" - 2 schools (Canton, Norton) limit to 10 absences/semester - "90%". 3 schools (Sharon, Franklin, Stoughton) have varieties of "85% rule". 1 school (Norwood) gives a warning at 90% and limits to 80%. 2 schools (Mansfield, North Attleboro) have no minimum attendance.

\* Dress Code - 5 schools have some form of dress code, most advising "discretion", but some prohibit hats, halters, shorts, and T-Shirts. 3 schools (Franklin, North Attleboro, Mansfield) have no written dress code.

Smoking Area - 5 schools allow smoking in designated areas. 4 schools (Mansfield, Sharon, Canton, Norton) have no official smoking areas.

Last-Period Study - 1 school (Newton North) has an open campus. 2 schools (Norwood, North Attleboro) allow students to leave if they have last period studies. 3 schools (Stoughton, Franklin, Mansfield) had open studies for seniors and depending on the school-juniors and members of the National Honor Society. 3 schools (Sharon, Norton, Canton) do not have open studies.

\*\*In-House Suspension - 5 schools have in-house suspension. 1 school (Norwood) gives parents the option of in-house or not. 1 school (Canton) has no in house suspension.

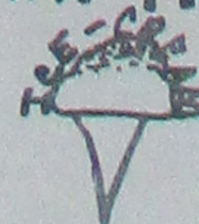

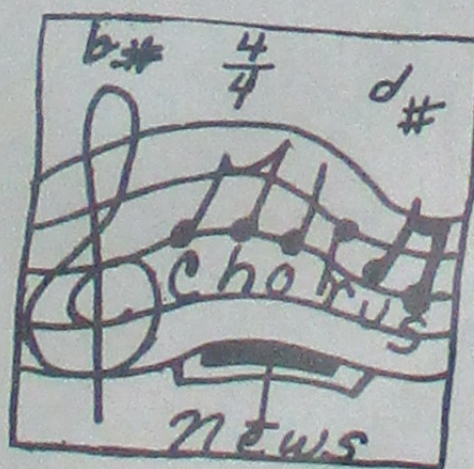

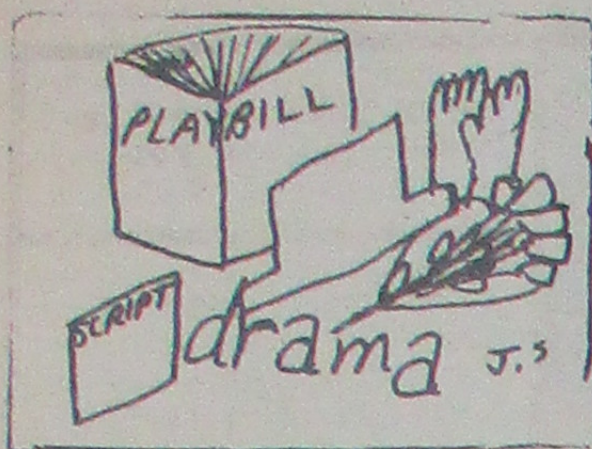
The Jazz Ensemble is starting to compete in local competitions and the Concert Band is planning on a local trip to the Junior High.

## MOVIES: BEST AND WORST OF 1980

Hurray for Hollywood! Maybe 1981 will be cheered for, but 1980 was a year many would like to forget. Michael Cimino's movie, "Heaven's Gate", a 3 hour epic of life in the 1860's, opened in New York to disastrous reviews. Cimino is re-cutting and shortening it down to a 2 hour version which will be released in 1981. It was a year in which we lost a great comic actor, Peter Sellers, who died of a heart attack. Everyone wanted to remember him for his charming, but paper thin portrayal of Chance Gardner in "Being There"; instead, we were subjected to "The Fiendish Plot of Fu Man Chu" which was a silly movie. It was also a year in which countless numbers of horror films were released, all of them just plain bad and gory.

There are good happenings to balance out the bad of the year. Robert Redford played a prison warden in the powerful film "Brubaker" and later in the year, he made his directorial debut in the film adaptation of Judith Guest's novel "Ordinary People" which was highly acclaimed. It was the year that a spoof on the Airport movies became a box office smash. A good Christmas crop ended the year in which there were many good features.

### The 10 Best Movies of 1980 (in alphabetical order)

Airplane is a movie that is a take off on the Airport movies of the 1970's. There are scenes that are take offs of "Saturday Night Fever", "Silver Streak", "Jaws" "From Here To Eternity". An all star cast takes a ride which could be their last. Airplane is the funniest movie of the year.

Being There is Peter Seller's next to last movie in which Shirley MacLaine and Melvyn Douglas co-star. Sellers plays Chance Gardner, an uneducated person, who is taken in by an affluent family and gains national recognition by speaking about the world in terms of gardening and television. Sellers proved again he is a great comical actor and this is a classic that will be remembered.

Brubaker is Robert Redford's summer contribution to 1980. Redford plays a prison warden who tries to fight the system to gain reform for the prison. It's a movie that ranks up top along with "The Candidate" and is one that will make you think.

The Great Santini is a heartwarming story of Col. Bull Meechan who is a Col. in the Marines and treats his family as if they were enlisted. It shows how a son tries to win his father's love when they don't see eye to eye. The film handles social problems of blacks and whites very nicely. A very good tear-jerker.

The Jazz Singer has been remade in 1980. The story is basically the same as the 1927 classic. Neil Diamond stars as Yosil Rabinovitch and Laurence Olivier stars as his father, the cantor. Many Jewish traditions are brought out making this film both cultural and enjoyable.

The Long Riders is the story of the James-Young's gang in the Old Wild West. From the poening scene of a bank robbery, the film is an explosive and violent epic. It stars Jim and Stacy Keach, and Dennis and Randy Quad. Unlike the old phony John Wayne westerns, this is the best western this side of Hollywood--You can bet your boots on that!

My Bodyguard is a warm, funny movie starring Matt Dillon and is about a new kid in school who is pestered by bullies, so he hires a kid to be his bodyguard. Martin Mull stars as the boy's father and Ruth Gordon as the boy's grandmother. This movie will amke you cheer as good and evil battle it out. It reminded me of "Breaking Away".

Ordinary People is the adaptation of Judith Guest's novel in which Robert Redford makes a dynamic directorial debut. Mary Tyler Moore, Donald Sutherland and Timothy Hutton star as a family trying to function after a personal tragedy in the family has occured. Moore is magnificent as the mother, Beth, and probably will win an Oscar for Best Actress. I thought it was a good movie although it could have done without the many psychiatric scenes between Conrad, played by Timothy Hutton and Dr. Berger, played by Judd Hirsch, otherwise, this is an Oscar contender for Best Picture.

Raging Bull is the third film in which Robert DeNiro and director Martin Scorsese have worked together (Mean Streets: New York, New York). De Niro plays Jake La Motta, a fighter who treats his women the same way he treats his opponets in the ring. This true, gritty story, filmed in black and white, examines La Motta's uprisings and his downfalls. This film reminded me a little of "Lenny" which starred Dustin Hoffman as Lenny Bruce. De Niro should receive an Oscar for Best Actor, just for one scene in which he gained 50 pounds to play a nightclub scene.

Urban Cowboy is the surprise movie of 1980. After seeing three of the worst movies of all time, Saturday Night Fever, Grease and Moment By Moment, I expected more of the same, the only difference being a la country style. I thought wrong. Travolta has finally learned how to act and how not to mumble. Travolta plays an Urban Cowboy who, like many, spends hard hat days and honky tonk nights at Gillys, a nightclub in Texas. The film contains a lot of good music, a mechanical bull and a hoe down of a good.

American Gigolo stars Richard Gere as a male prostitute who hops in and out of bed with girls. There is also a murder charge on someone. I liked Gere in "Yanks" but this film put me to sleep.

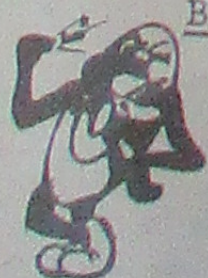

## BOSTON BEATLES CONVENTION

On December 12, 13, and 14, the Bradford Hotel was the site for a recreation of musical history during the first Annual Boston Beatles Convention. For three days, the Bradford came alive as thousands poured into it to relive yesterday and experience once again the magic of the sixties.

Dealers from all parts of the country packed the booths with memorabilia from Beatle records, photos, and buttons to Beatle lunch boxes, notebooks, and games.

People wandered through the hotel absorbing Beatle nostalgia while the Beatles and Apple recreated the Beatles music. Movies and concert clips were shown as well as Joel Glazier's slide-tape presentation on the 1969 "Paul is dead" rumors.

The Beatles Convention was conducted on a sad note as the tragic killing of John Lennon occurred only days earlier. The mood was somber; The crowd was quiet.

A special memorial for John Lennon was presented and Charles Rosenay!!!, a devout Lennon fan and one of the Convention's producers, performed his version of Lennon's "Imagine" which he wrote the night of John's death...

"Imagine no more Lennon

And no more Walrus too  
Imagine no John Lennon  
Living life in peace..."

Stephen Brill, publisher of All Things Must Pass and a dealer at the convention, felt that John's death generated interest to the convention and added to business.

Joe Pope, publisher of Strawberry Fields Forever, said that had John not been killed, John would have dropped by the Convention as he was supposed to take his son Sean to see The Nutcracker.

Although the tone of the Convention was low-key because of John's death, the Convention showed that the magic lives and the Beatles are alive as ever.

### "The Rings"

#### The Rings-MCA Records

The "Rings" are powerful quartet who have been playing the Boston club circuit for a number of years. Their debut album on MCA records has just recently reached record stores and is already gaining quite a bit of radio play.

The "Rings" music is quite similar to that of the "Cars", a Boston band who have already reached "success". Like the "Cars", the "Rings" have brought together many styles of music, such as rock, new wave, funk, and reggae, enabling them to exhibit their own distinctive "pop" sound.

The band members, Bob Gifford, bass; Mark Sutton, lead; Mike Baker, rhythm; and Matt Thurber, drums; each display their own talents strongly. A lead singer has not been established as yet, which I believe to be a positive aspect of a band. Gifford's vocal intensity is featured greatly in his songs, "I Need Strange", and "Got My Wish". Mike Baker's "Let Me Go" is the song that is getting the most airplay. With its pop characteristics, it has much top 40 potential, perhaps too much. Guitarist/Vocalist Mark Sutton does not over emphasize his guitar leads, which turn up at the right moment in every song. His tune, "Who's She Dancin' With" is a strong candidate for their second cut, after Baker's "Let Me Go".

The "Rings" have toured Boston as a back-up band many times (once for the "Cars"). Although a bit too loud in concert, their live performance enhances their self-produced album perfectly.

First albums tend to be a bit discreet, but not this one. The "Rings" hit their devotees with full blast, and they could easily become Boston's next big contribution to Rock music.

## TRUST: ELVIS COSTELLO AND THE ATTRACTIONS

Elvis Costello does not have the most versatile voice, yet Trust is his sixth strong album since his first in 1977 (not to mention his dozens of singles unreleased in the U.S.) His success lies mainly in the fact that each album changes slightly from the other. His last album, Taking Liberties, contains 20 songs, each demonstrating his wide range of style. Trust contains 14 songs, most with the same distinctive Costello style. On both albums Elvis displays his unique, powerful voice, which dominates on every one of his songs.

The most obvious change found in Trust is the presence of more piano, as opposed to the ever-present organ found in his last couple of albums. This is the most noticeable on his ballad "Shot with His Own Gun," a song containing only Steve Nieve on piano and Elvis Costello on vocals.

Another change Elvis has made is the addition of guest musicians. In "From a Whisper to a Scream," Elvis introduces Glenn Tilbrook, the lead singer from Squeeze, on vocals and Martin Belmont on guitar. This is the first notable time Elvis has shared the lead singing with another, and "Whisper" is definitely one of the stronger candidates for a released single.

These changes in Trust from Elvis' past albums help to make Trust distinctive from Costello's past works; however, if you are not a Costello fan, these changes will not be enough to change your mind.

### TRIBUTE (\*\*\*\*)

It was Shakespeare who said, "All the world's a stage," and it is that phrase by which Scottie Templeton lives his life. 20th Century Fox's Tribute stars Jack Lemmon as Scottie, a former writer-producer, now press agent, who thinks life is one punchline after another, Lee Remick as Maggie Stratton, Scottie's ex-wife, and Robby Benson as Scottie's son, Judd. Tribute reunites Jack Lemmon and Lee Remick whose last film together was Days of Wine and Roses made in 1962.

As the film opens we learn Scottie has encountered a blood disease. His ex-wife, Maggie, and his 21 year old son Judd visit him, where in private Scottie tells Maggie the bad news. Scottie requests that Judd stay with him a while, but Judd, had never forgiven his father for leaving him and his mother. After some conflicts his mother persuades him to stay. When Maggie tells Judd the news of his father, we sense Judd's anger as he has no compassion for his father. Scottie tries to win his son by comedy routines and fixing him up with a hooker, both unsuccessful. We see Scottie and Judd battling it out and insulting each other with lines such as,

"You're the son I never wanted"

"I never wanted a father like you"

and usually the only time they make contact with each other is when fighting.

Lemmon's character looks at life as if it were one big comedy routine. As the disease progresses and Scottie is in the hospital, he thinks it is a party. It reminded much of Roy Scheider's character of Joe Gideon in All That Jazz. Lemmon provides a magnificent performance equally as good as his role in his last film The China Syndrome. The refreshing role of Maggie is played well by Lee Remick. I thought Remick had hit rock bottom after seeing her last film The Competition, but I underestimated her. The surprise of the film was Robby Benson's performance as Judd. After seeing him in mainly comedies, One On One, The End, Die Laughing Benson, who plays the part perfectly, proves he can also play straight roles. To me, Benson looks like a high school student, but I'm sure he will be around for a long time.

A couple of scenes that deal with the doctor's telling Scottie about the disease and the doctor's telling Judd about it, come through brilliantly with no voices, although there are mouths moving; the actions speak louder than the words. Progression of Scottie's disease is shown in a series of still photographs which enhances the film, instead of showing live action of suffering. Tribute is unlike a movie such as Love Story, as Tribute sometimes puts Scottie's disease on the back burner and puts Scottie's and Judd's relationship up front.

Tribute is a warm, funny and sad film. It's a movie for everyone who lost their father's love or for anyone who wants to make sure they can maintain a strong bond. The film can have the effect of bringing days of wine and roses or bring days that are as devastating as the aftermath of a nuclear meltdown.

## THE JAZZ SINGER \*\*\*

In 1927, history was made when the first motion picture with a sound track was released. The Jazz Singer, starring Al Jolson, is a cornerstone in the industry and a cinema classic. Twenty seven years later, in 1954, the first remake was released starring Danny Thomas. In these time of sequels comes forth the second remake. This contemporary version stars Neil Diamond as Yosel Rabinovitch; Laurence Olivier as Yosel's father, who is also the cantor; Catlin Adams, as Yosel's wife and Lucie Arnaz as Yosel's manager.

Basically, the story is the same as the original, but with some things that were never thought of in 1927. Jess Robins (stage name), sings in a band while his father, the cantor, sings in the temple. Jess also sings in the temple, but he wants to get out and see places other than New York City. Conflict begins when Jess tells his father he going to see about a singing job in Los Angeles. His father wants him to stay in New York and sing in the temple where he will get a steady pay check, but most important to the father is for Jess to carry on the tradition of five generations of Rabinovitch cantors that came before Jess. Jewish traditions are brought out in one scene when Jess' father visits him in Los Angeles only to find him living with a Gentile, where upon the father performs the tradition of ripping a piece of his clothing and saying a prayer for the dead in effect, disowning his son.

Diamond wrote the music for the film of which there is too much. At one point in the film there is a half an hour of concert footage. By the time we get back to the story the buildup of the emotions we felt for the characters are wiped away.

The film is good as it contrasts the differences of traditional views and contemporary views. We see both the father and son singing: the father, traditionally; the son, contemporarily, and they realize that they both have congregations. The only difference is that Jess has his in concert halls. Many Gentiles may not understand or appreciate this film which shows many Jewish traditions and has some Yiddish phrases. I enjoyed this film as it is a part of my culture. It is not often that a film devotes its them and characters to Judaism. I can only name two films, The Frisco Kid (1979), about a rabbi in the 1850's and Fiddler on the Roof (1971), about life in Russia in the early 1900's. Like The Jazz Singer, Fiddler has traditions as a main theme.

Even though more bases are covered in this 1980 version than in the 1927 version, this is a film for all people to see, for it explores the love of a son and father, even if they don't see eye to eye. All types of people come into contact with these problems. For the Gentile filmgoer, a helpful hint to understand the movie, bring a Yiddish dictionary and a Jew.

## Alan Parsons Project: A Turn of a Friendly Card \*\*\*\*

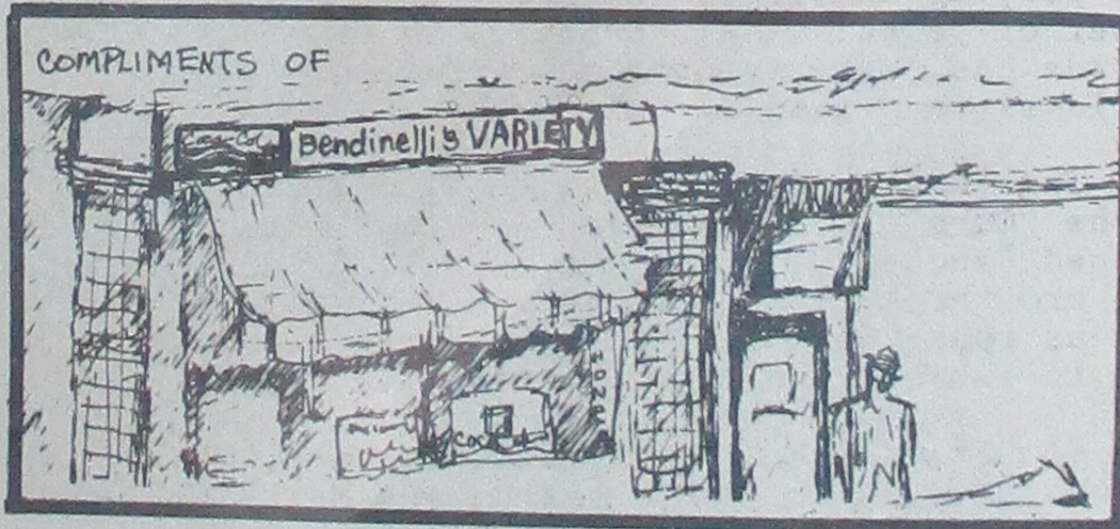
On their fifth effort, the Alan Parsons Project deals with an all too familiar theme: gambling. They combine their songs into a tale of obsession with the sin that has led many to an early grave.

Side one opens with "May Be a Price to Pay." It deals with the growing need of the man in the song to gamble. This leads into "Games People Play" where he is drawn into the game's magnetic pull to take a chance. In "Time" he says "Good-bye, my friends, maybe forever... The stars wait for me... Time keeps flowing like a river to the sea. As Time passes by, he's led into "Don't Wanna Go Home." By this time, he's deep into gambling and warned to go home, but it's too late, for he has been "blinded with diamonds and all the money that money can buy." By this time, he realizes that the only way he can go is up.

Side two opens with "The Turn of a Friendly Card." In this song, a connotation to the gambling capital of the world, Las Vegas, is evident. "There's a sign in the desert that lies to the west, where you can't tell the night from the sunrise, and not all the King's horses and all the King's men have prevented the fall of the unwise." "Snake Eyes" and "The Ace of Swords" follow and they deal with the hope of those who wish for snake eyes, sevens, and elevens. Unfortunately, these numbers seldom appear and the participants have "Nothing Left to Lose," the next song on the road to oblivion. The album culminates with part two of "A Turn of a Friendly Card" where "The unsmiling faces in fetters and chains on a wheel in perpetual motion who belong to all races and answer all names with no show of an outward emotion. And they think it will make their lives easier but the doorway before them is barred, and the game never ends when your whole world depends on the turn of a friendly card, no the game never ends when your whole world depends on the turn of a friendly card."

This album is excellent. It gets its point across effectively with the use of a unique rock sound greatly lacking the screams and shrieks of much of today's rock. It is a good change of pace album for those of you who are used to the hard rock of 'COZ and 'AAF. Overall, it's a welcome edition to and rock fan's album collection.

## To Be or Not To Be

Everyone is more than eager to know what will become of our school as a result of Proposition 2½, but as of yet, no decisions have been made. What the proposition states is that Massachusetts homeowners should not have to pay a tax of more than 2½% of the fair market value of their property. This proposition is valid for two years, when it will be possible for voters and legislature to alter or abolish it. In Sharon specifically, this means that starting on September 1, 1981, the town will have \$1,150,000 less in its budget than last year, and the cuts will be even more painful next year as inflation continues to skyrocket.

What exactly does this mean to us? Every aspect of the town's budget will be cut: allocations for the fire department, the police department, public services, etc., but since 60-70% of a town's budget goes to its schools, we will be the hardest hit. So far, the planning is still in the works. The Superintendent of Schools has written his recommendation on a new budget, but it has yet to be approved by the school committee and then passed by a majority vote in the town meeting. The Superintendent has made the following recommendations:

1. Because 80% of the budget is spent on salaries, the greatest cuts will be in the faculty. Instead of doing away with entire departments and programs, the cuts will be made across the board—teacher(s) from each department, secretaries, advisors, etc. Deciding exactly whom they must let go is complicated; they must consider the individuals' contractual obligations, their years of training and experience, personal recommendations and evaluations, and the needs of the school.
2. Tennis, golf, winter track, and gymnastics will be cut, leaving boys' and girls' basketball, cross-country, and spring track; boys' baseball, football, and soccer; and girls' field hockey and softball.
3. All extra-curricular activities will remain: the debating team, the math team, the newspaper, etc.
4. Accounting for less than 1/5 of the entire budget, field trips will be cut and the purchasing of books and materials will be reduced.

Whose fault is this? Basically, the blame belongs to every person who voted in favor of Proposition 2½. The purpose of the proposition was to force the government of Massachusetts to cut down on its extravagant spending, possibly do away with its doormen, elevator operators, and personal shoeshine boys. How the voters could have been so naive as to believe this would happen, I don't know, but desperate people take desperate measures. And the politicians are having their revenge: they have hit us in the heart of our society—our schools, our police protection and our fire protection. 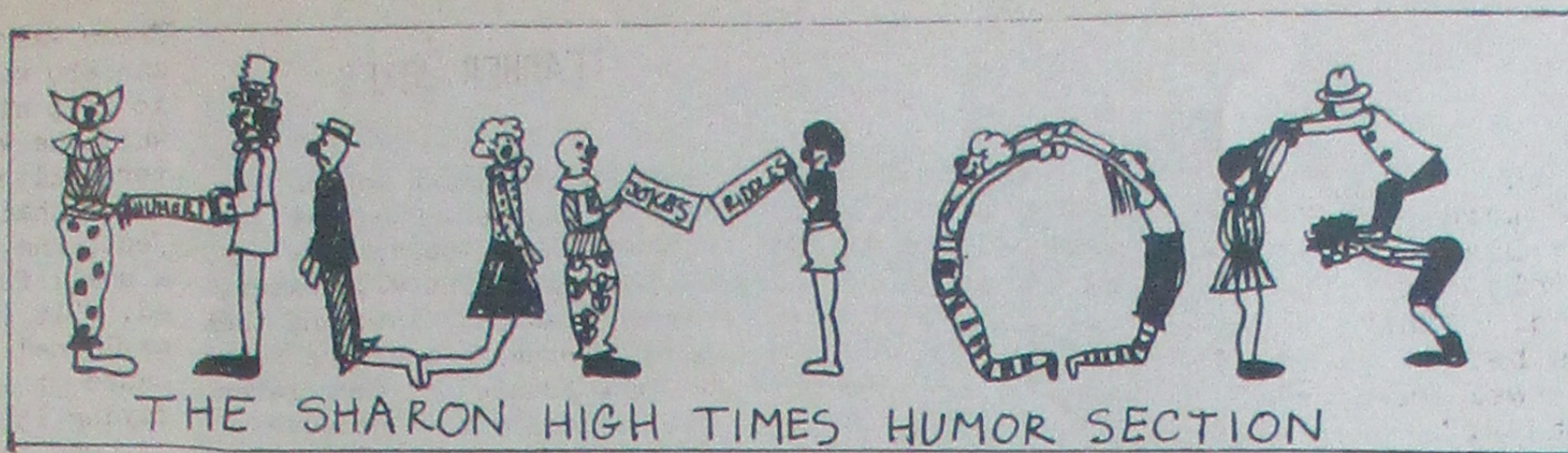
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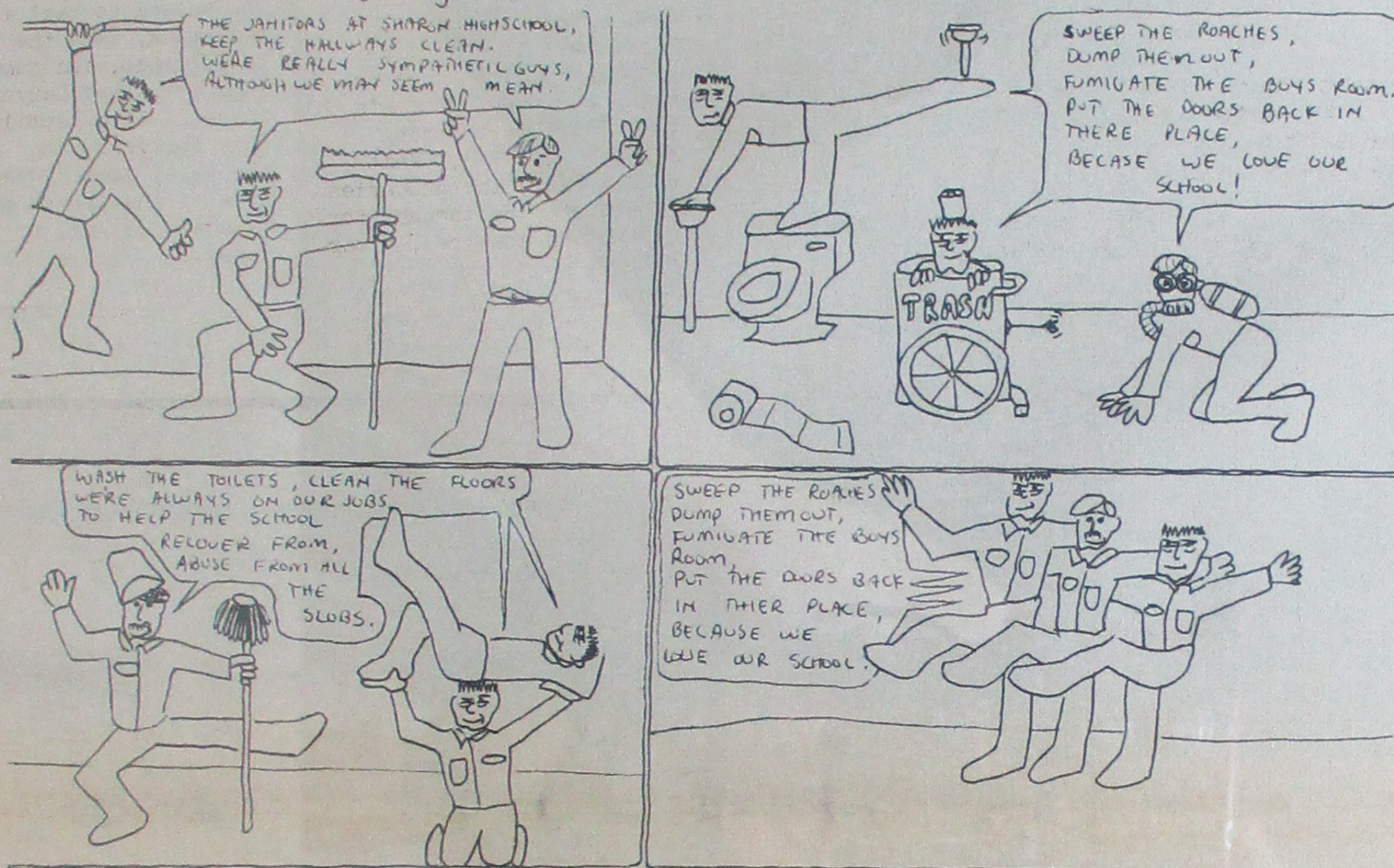

The varsity basketball team started off their season with a surprise as they lost three out of their first four games. After beating Attleboro rather easily in the North Attleboro Christmas Tournament, they lost to Bishop Feehan in the finals. The next week, they also lost to Cathedral and Dover-Sherborn at home. However, things turned around when the Hockomock League season began. The team put it together and began to win. After having a relatively easy time with Canton and King Philip, winning by the scores of 74-51 and 84-60 respectively, they had to face two tough teams in Stoughton and Mansfield.
