According to the responses of 262 students, the make-up of Sharon High School is 41% male.

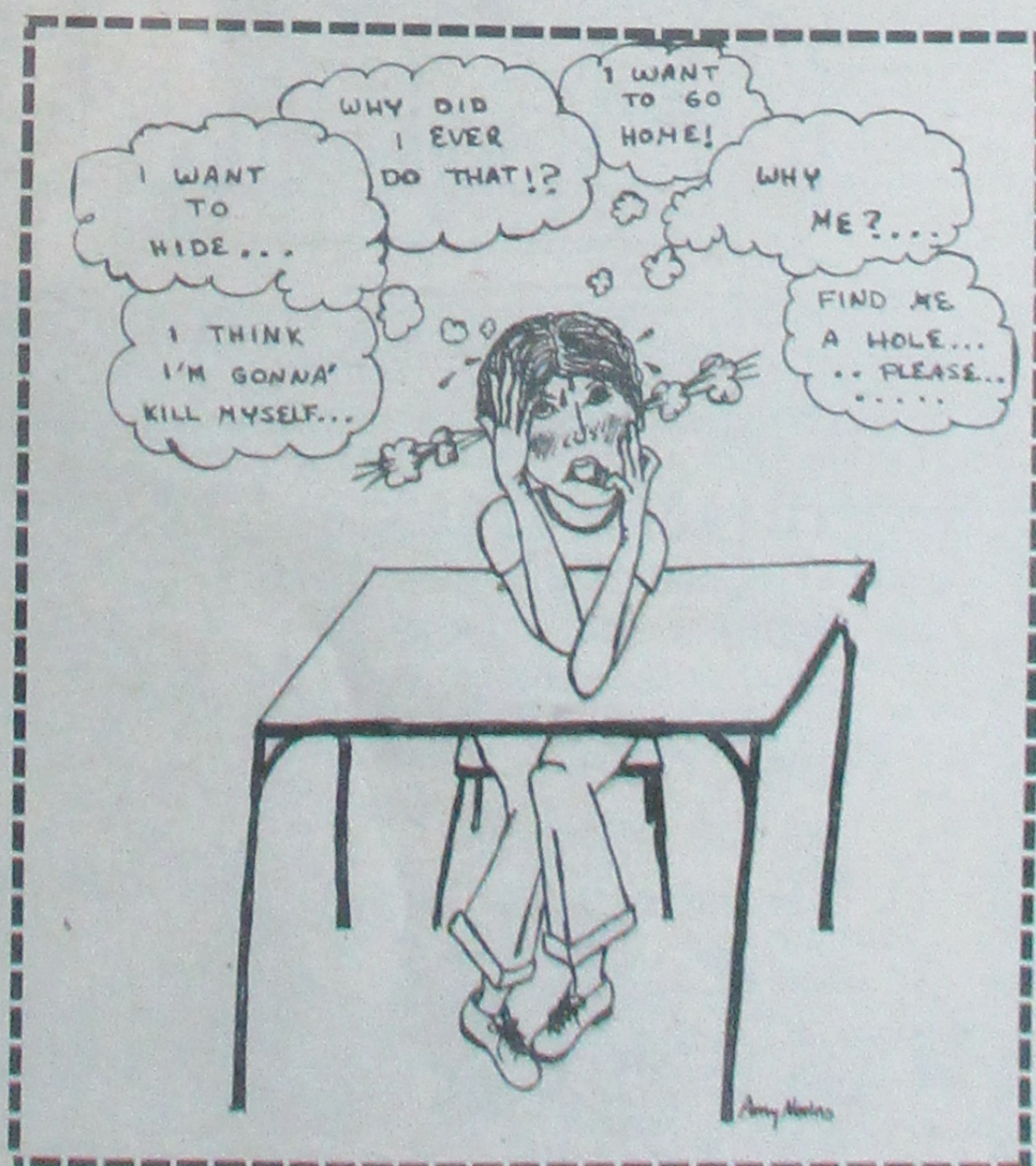
TELEPOOP BY SAL THE SQUEALER

Falling down a flight of stairs at a basketball game with Cokes and popcorn and spilling it on people.

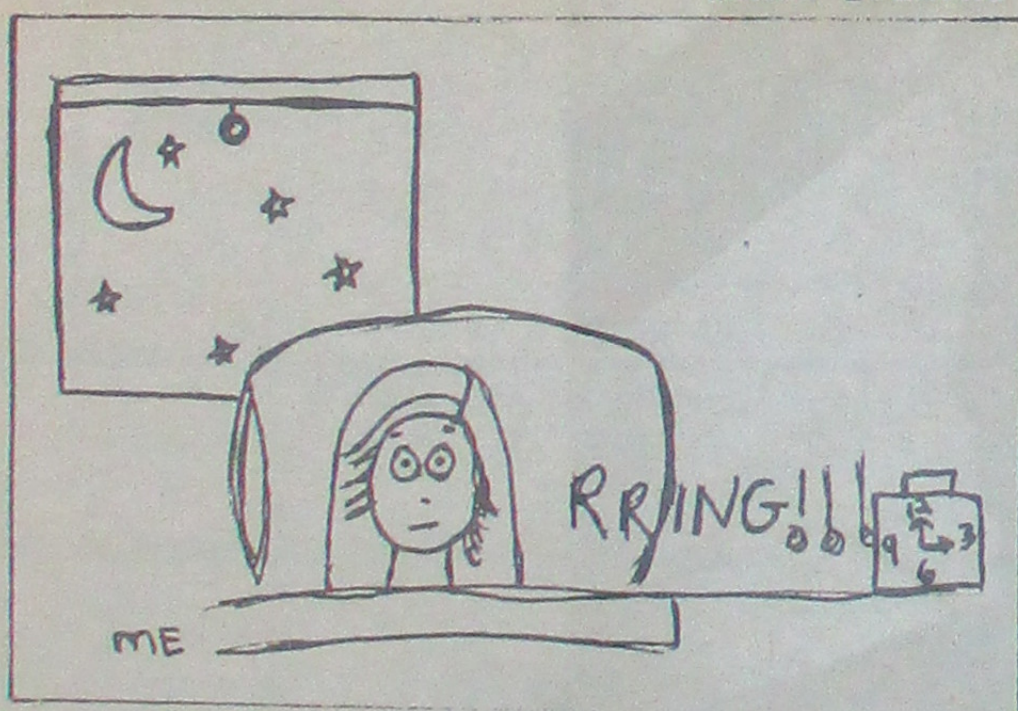
A man putting down the carpet in my house walked into my room while I was getting undressed.

Diving into a pool and not having your bathing suit go with you.



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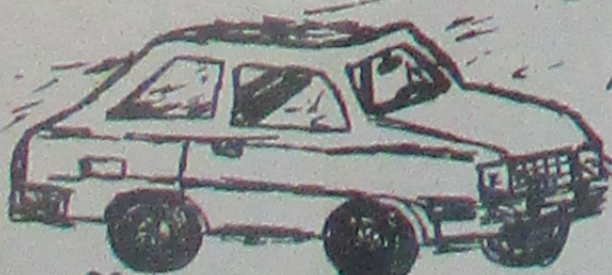
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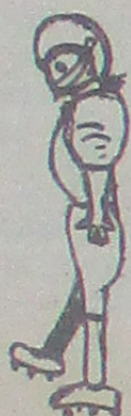
When I was sleepwalking, I went into the livingroom, kissed the wall, and went back to bed.



Forgetting to zip my zipper after gym and having my boyfriend's best friend tell me about it.

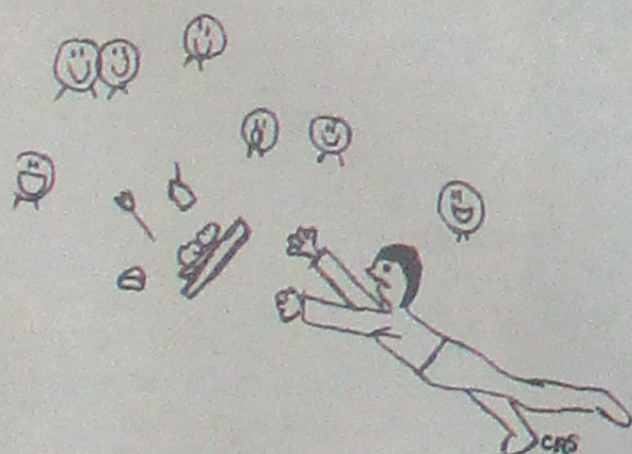
When my teacher read a personal note in front of the class.

When I tell my friend something about a girl, and he says it out loud when I'm with her.

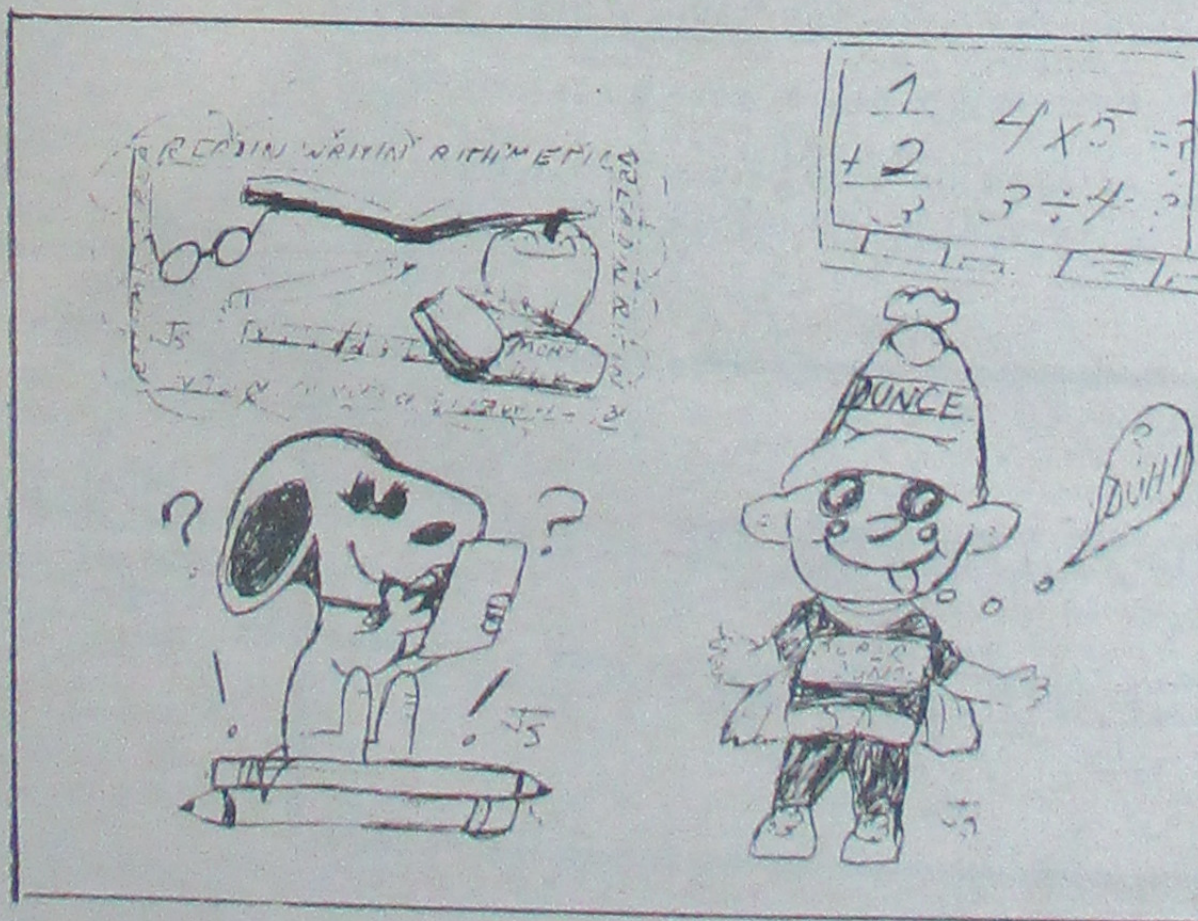
Having to read an English composition in front of the class.

45% female, and 14% other. The sexual varieties of those in the "other" category could even be fertile ground for a future Sharon High Times Feature. HEARTWORM SEASON Time To Get Your Dog Tested

In a month or so the warm sunny days of Spring will be with us. Which means it's time to get your 'faithful friend' tested for heartworm. Heartworm is a serious disease which is carried by the mosquito and can be transmitted anytime from late spring, to early winter, to the canine.

Mosquitoes intake blood from an infected dog and then, in turn, bite another dog and infect it also. In the blood is the heartworm larvae that eventually becomes the problem causing worm. The heartworm (*Dirofilaria immitis*) lives as an adult in a dog's heart chambers and pulmonary arteries in the lungs. The worms can grow to be as long as 14 inches so they block the blood flow leading to organ damage or ultimately, death.

Common symptoms of an infected dog are coughing, labored breathing, and uncommon weakness. The disease can occur in any dog regardless of sex, age, or breed. A way to prevent this from happening to your dog is by having him tested by a veterinarian. It is a simple blood test that should be administered in April. Blood is drawn from your dog's front paw, filtered and finally read under a microscope. It takes a matter of minutes and is done while you wait. If the test results are negative your dog is fine and is put on preventive medicine until the end of December, so he won't get it. If the results are positive the dog can either be treated or put to sleep. The treatment takes approximately 6-8 weeks to be done and can run to cost almost \$200.00.

The test costs under \$10.00 and the medication is varied in price. Don't you think it is safer to spend less than \$25.00 to get your dog tested and protected rather than risk losing him or having him suffer?

Interview with Teacher-Author Mrs. Wartski

Mrs. Maureen Crane Wartski was born in 1940 in Ashiya, Japan. She grew up there and went to private school. Her graduating class consisted of thirty people, sixteen of whom were from different countries. She attended college for two years in California at the University of Redlands and finished in Tokyo at Sophia University. She majored in English, literature and journalism.

Mrs. Wartski taught privately overseas for a while and re-entered the field of teaching three years ago as a substitute teacher. About seven years ago, she became proficient at writing and needed to devote all her time to it. Only recently has she had an opportunity for full time teaching and writing. At this point, she has been writing for twenty five years. The reason why she teaches as well as writes is because she feels, "that taking a piece of literature and seeing somebody come to life is almost as terrific as writing itself."

Her first book is entitled My Brother is Special. It is about the special olympics. Her second book is called A Boat to Nowhere, and recently it has been awarded the 1980 National Bankstreet School Award. This book deals with the Vietnamese refugees getting out of Vietnam. Her third book, A Long Way From Home, and also a continuation of her second, describes the refugees trip to America. She has a fourth book in the works, which is coming out in November.

All of Mrs. Wartski's books have been written for young adults. She says that she has given some thought to writing a book other than a young adult novel, but she thinks that there really isn't enough good fiction on the shelves for kids.

Along with her young adult novels, Mrs. Wartski has written stories for magazines such as "Redbook", "Teen Magazine", and "New England Magazine". She commented however, that she'd rather write a book than a short story, as it is harder to write her thoughts down in only a few hundred words, whereas she is freer to express openly and lengthily her feelings in a book.

People have written to her in response to her books and she appreciates their letters as good feedback. I personally have read Mrs. Wartski's A Boat to Nowhere and have found it to be extremely interesting. I suggest that other students might find her books informative as well as interesting.

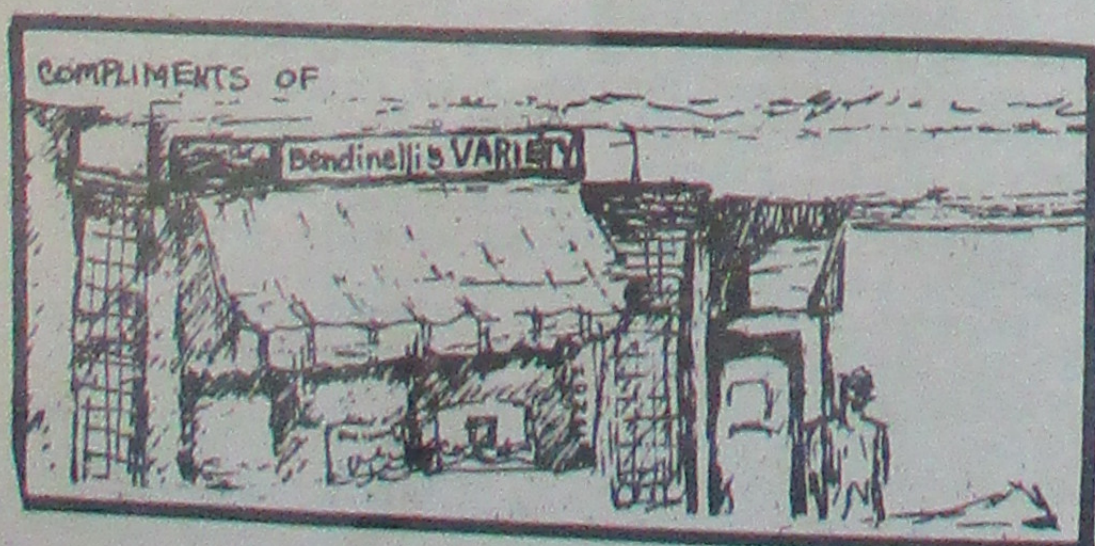

Vietnamese Boat People at Sharon High?

If you look closely around Sharon High, or if you're familiar with the Student Exchange Club, you will notice there are quite a few kids here from other countries. They are in Sharon either for just a year or to live permanently, and they come from all over - France, Sweden, Italy, Japan, Australia, you name it! Two of these kids are Thanh and Lien Chuong. They are boat people from Viet Nam.

Thanh, 18, and his sister Lien, 20, left South Vietnam in 1979 after cities surrounding their home in Saigon were bombed. By boat, they traveled to a refugee camp in Malaysia. When asked to describe their trip on the boat, they said they went for ten days without food or water, and it was very cold. There were 114 people with them in a small boat.

At the refugee camp, conditions were better. Thanh said that some people ate so much fish, though, that their skin became scaly.

After a few months, they came to Hartford, Connecticut, where they were sponsored by a church. They lived with their two brothers, who had left Viet Nam before them. They worked and went to night school to learn English.

Since they came to Sharon, Thanh and Lien have lived with four other people. There are two adults, not related, and two smaller children who go to school.

They came from a 13-member family: two brothers live in Australia while their parents and five more brothers and sisters are still in Viet Nam. When they want to communicate with their parents, they have to call Australia and give the message through their brothers there. They'd like to get the rest of their family out of Viet Nam, but the government probably won't allow it.

At school in Viet Nam, they studied and spoke both Vietnamese and Chinese. Classes usually had about fifty people. Instead of eating in a cafeteria, they went home for lunch. When asked if they minded the new change, they said "no" so hopefully, they're happy with their new lives.

Our class day will be sometime in the middle June, and hopefully our exchange students (Helaine, Pam, Karen, and Paul) will be back by then and be able to join us.


The juniors will also be fortunate enough to receive the candy store from the Class of '81 after April vacation. Any juniors interested in working there see Ross or myself.

Their school system is very different from the way most of us are accustomed to schools. Their school starts in February and ends in late November, whereas ours begins in September and finishes in the latter part of June. Their type of scheduling is similar, although they have a 20 minute snack at 11:00 and an hour lunch period at 12:30. Due to the weather, everyone is able to eat outside on the grass. One nice idea incorporated into their program is an activity called "sport". On Wednesday afternoon, the whole school participates in sport which is when the students are able to pick a sport they would like to play for a 6 week period.

On the weekends, the kids go to beach parties, drive-ins and discos. Because of the ideal climate, sports such as sailing, skiing, surfing and fishing are done all year round.

Harvey Bay, where Darryl lives, is comprised of four towns with a total population of about 14,000. This number increases to 25,000 in the summer. Harvey Bay is not really an industrialized place- there are no high rise office buildings or apartments.

We also discussed drugs and alcohol. Darryl said that pot is accessible and not many indulge where he lives, but in the city speed and heroin are major problems. There the drinking age is 17, but it is not enforced, and he commented that there is an alcohol problem in the country due to their "manana" attitude.

Darryl graduated high school last year, and when he returns home, he is planning to attend college where he would like to pursue a job as a teacher involving the math and science fields. I wish him all the luck for a good year at Sharon High filled with only good memories to return home with.

If I go see a band perform, I'd rather hear good music than see a Halloween show; that's exactly what punk is--it's a bunch of people dressing up, like on Halloween, masquerading as musicians.

Punk is just a passing phase, rock will continue its dominance and outlast this fad and the many more to come.

Until a variety of forces both in the U.S. and in England teamed up to create what came to be known as "new wave," rock music had been suffering greatly from "mighty" rock groups playing for stadium-sized audiences who could not relate with their favorite band through binoculars. In the early seventies the major bands who had led the "British invasion" lost interest in any further challenge of the supposed boundaries that limit music. As a result most of the music of the seventies was uninteresting.

With the glitter of disco everywhere, and commercial success slowing down the rockers of the sixties, a new type of music was needed to bring rock back to its basics. By 1976 "new wave" and "punk rock" sought to return rock to its traditional roots.

The English musical scene was undergoing a much needed major change, with new and different bands infiltrating the pub-rock scene. These bands were labeled "punk." What Americans saw of "punk" however, was the safety pins through the cheeks, masochistic clothing, vulgarity on stage, and rumours of club violence. (Much like the objections to the "Beatles" long hair in 1964 and the several police arrests of Jim Morrison in 1969 for obscene language and indecent exposure on stage. An interesting note for "Doors" fans: after the untimely death of Jim Morrison in 1971, Ray Manzerek tried to replace Morrison with Iggy Pop, master of "new wave".) These negative connotations of "punk" scared American crowds who did not give the music a fair listening to.

Now it is 1981, and a much different story. An incredible barrage of "new wave" bands have found commercial success everywhere. Some of these bands are "The Police", "Blondie", "The Cars", "Devo", "Cheap Trick", "Joe Jackson", "Elvis Costello", and "The Clash". Many not as popular "new wave" bands such as "The Jam", "X + C", "Squeeze", "The Ramones", and others have been able to easily sell-out small clubs (500-1000 seats) such as "The Paradise," in Boston. Unfortunately the drinking age is twenty, and most as minors are not getting to see these bands before they too become big. (most of the aforementioned bands have played the Paradise.)

If forward lookers like "The Clash" and "Elvis Costello" continue to sell records, they will drastically influence the development of Rock & Roll over the next few years. I, for one, do not intend to be listening to the same five "Doors" albums ten years from now.

The Jam "Sound Affects"

The Jam. Now you are probably asking yourself, "Who and what is 'The Jam'?"

The Jam is a three man band from England, most easily categorized by the term "New Wave," consisting of Paul Weller, the writer of most of the songs and an outstanding guitarist; Rick Buckler, the broad and bearded one who is responsible for the band's distinctive drum beat; and Bruce Foxton, who adds his four string bass guitar to finish off the bottom end of The Jam's effective sounds.

The Jam is one of England's top groups at the present time and has been climbing to this spot with the aid of their past four albums. It appears that "Sound Affects" is the stepping stone The Jam needed to reach this level.

The album opens with "Start!". This song should sound familiar to most because it is a variation of the Beatles' "Taxman"; most similar being Weller's lead guitar riff and Foxton's dominating bass. With "Start!", Weller intro-

duces us to one of the band's motivating ideas:

"It's not important for you to know my name-
Nor I to know yours
If we communicate for two minutes only
It will be enough!"

The second song on the ten song album is
The Jam's way of restating the rich man's
"Golden Rule" (which just happens to be the
man with the gold - Rules Weller)

"That power is measured by the pound or
the fist-

It's as clear as this oh-

He then goes on to tell us what he can do and
get when he has a pocket full of "Pretty Green",
the title of the song.

This brings us to "Monday", a song that
has been getting a good deal of radio play here
in Boston, (mostly by WBCN). This is a very
catchy and melodic tune that has its lead
shared basically by the drums and the bass.

Most of the other tracks on the album are
spearheaded by Weller's lead guitar. "Man in
the Corner Shop" could be used as the
workingclass man's theme song, as long as you
are able to decipher the muffled lyrics, which
is made easier with the aid of the printed lyr-
ics found on the inner sleeve. "That's Enter-
tainment" appears to contain an idea to help
us make it through those long, long days that
contain some minor but irritating inconveniences,
such as:

"Waking up at 6 AM on a cool warm morning-
Opening the windows and breathing in petrol-"
"Cuddling a warm girl and smelling stale
perfume."

Weller goes on from there with other items that
should be looked upon and considered entertain-
ment.

The Jam has a clean and unique sound that
really has not been heard since the Fab Four.

"Sound Affects'" most intense and energetic
track is "Set the House Ablaze". This seems to
be a cross between something the early Rolling
Stones and The Who would create.

Well, now you know who The Jam is and what
their latest (and probably best) album is about.
It seems that a great deal of people are aware
of The Jam because even after seven weeks of
being out in the stores, it is still selling
at such a rate as to be listed in WBCN's "top
twenty-five most purchased albums in Boston"
list.

Now, just as we opened this review with a
question, I would like to close it: Do you want
to wait for this album to become popular in
America before you listen to them and enjoy them?

Animated cartoons have been around for a long
time with such early features as Betty Boop and
Popeye. Walt Disney became a household name with
full length features such as "Snow White and the
Seven Dwarfs" and the highly praised Fantasia.
In the 1970's animation grew up when Ralph Bakshi
made "Fritz the Cat" and "Heavy Traffic", two
x-rated feature films. Bakshi, who also made "Lord
of the Rings", now explores the american popular
music culture in an anthology then spans the 20th
century into the 1980's.

American Pop follows four generations of a
family trying to make it in show business. The
film opens in Pre-Revolutionary Russia where the
first character, Zalmie, leaves Russia for America
and tries to make it in sleazy burlesque houses.
We follow Zalmie through the 1930's. In the 1940's
we meet Zalmie's son, Benny, who tries his luck at
the piano. Benny's story is parallel to Glenn
Miller's fate. The next character is Benny's son,
Tony. Tony seems to be the only character who is
on the screen for a long period of time. Tony
tries to make his fame in the 50's and 60's. We
are lead into the 80's by Tony's illegitimate son,
Pete. Throughout the film, Bakshi nicely shows
the problems and culture of the decade. The 20's
and 30's show organized crime. In the 40's, we
see World War II, in the 50's, the beatnik scene
is shown. The 60's brings up the drug problems
and also the flower children. Bakshi soars into
the 80's with the punk rock scenes.

The sound track that accompanies the film
always goes along with the times. The 40's brings
Jazz recordings. The music in the early 60's in-
cludes Dave Brubeck's "Take Five" and Sam Cook's
"You Send Me". The middle 60's bring the sound
of the Mamas and the Papas. "California Dreamin'"
and The Doors "People are Strange". In the late
60's, we hear Jefferson Airplane and Janis Joplin.
The 70's bring Bob Seger's "Night Move" which is
sung through Pete. It's a very funny scene as we
hear Seger's voice and see a strange face. The
80's brings Pat Benitar's "Hell is for Children".
The only star who was animated was Jimmy Hendrix,
a very stupid choice, a waste of time as well as
film.

Although American Pop can be called a cartoon,
it is more of an adult film. The film nicely
changes installments through series of still photos
of the time. The film was logical and had some
good surprises. The animation was so real that I
wonder if the figures really did exist. The
film explores the music of the 20th century, and
Bakshi presents it with a snap, crackle and a lot
of pop.

VISAGE: VISAGE

Visage, a promising new wave group takes
you on a journey into the stratosphere with the
use of stridulous frequencies of the electronic
variety. With the use of these often high pitch-
ed sounds, they blend in vocals that are often
as impressive sounding as the melodic part. The
combination creates a formula for an interesting
album.

Visage is Steven Strange, Midge Ure, Billy
Currie, John McGeoch, Rusty Egan, and Dave For-
mula. Together their first effort is pulled off
successfully.

Instruments used mostly in their music are
synthesizerz, rythm and electric violin.

All the cuts on the slbum are worthy to
listen to, but Fade to Grey is by far the most
impressive. It combines Visage's talents with
the sexy, sensuous voice of "Brigitte". In the
song she speaks phrases in french between the
refrains and the instrument preludes.

Visage had hit the new wave scene virtual-
ly unnoticed. But, with some air play and word
of mouth, they could soon become an important
name to watch and get recognition they deserve.

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Well, all you mellow music lovers, after two long years James Taylor has finally come out with a new album. This one is called "Dad Loves His Work" and it proves to be as great as his past albums. The album cover depicts him as some sort of steel worker and the photographs, in my opinion, leave much to be desired. But of course it's what's inside that counts and what's inside this one is really good.

JT's music on this album has changed style from his other albums by having added a little more beat to it such as in "Hard Times" and "Hour that the Morning Comes". It takes a little getting used to if you're used to his mellower tunes. "Hard Times" and "Her Town Too" (J.T. with J.D. Souther) have gotten the most air play of the songs on this album and the response has been good. The haunting but beautiful "Believe it or Not" and "I Will Follow" offer a nice contrast for the almost rowdy "Stand and Fight" (Dan Dugmore and Waddy Wachtel are great on electric guitar and of course Leland Sklar on bass) in which James is saying to stand up for what you believe in and not to let people walk all over you. "You ain't doing nobody no kind of favors lying around like a rug on their floor. / Sooner or later you've got to stand up and say you won't take any more. / Stand up stand and fight!"

Another cut, "Summer's Here" is light and carefree and should become popular once that time of year rolls around. All in all this album has a nice balance of fast and slow songs to please any "softrockers" and of course any J.T. fan.

SCANNERS **

Two weeks previous to the opening of Scanners I happened to be watching Sneak Previews. As I watched the clip from Scanners I thought the movie looked spectacular. One week before it came out I saw the television commercial, and I knew I had to see it.

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REO Speedwagon is the name of a group of five talented musicians (Gary Richrath, lead guitar; Bruce Hall, bass; Neal Doughty, piano; Allan Gratzner, drums; Kevin Cronin, lead vocals) who have just recently burst into the limelight of American rock music. It is the release of their most recent album, Hi infidelity, that has made REO Speedwagon a household term, at least in the homes of those people who love good rock music.

Of the ten songs on Hi infidelity, four have been released to the mass market (Don't Let Him Go, Keep on Loving You, Take it on the Run, Tough Guys). I won't get into describing these songs for you now; all you have to do is tune into WCOZ and you're bound to hear one of them before long. Of the other cuts on the album, follow my heart is a love song with a good rhythm and one of the album's best guitar solos, though the lyrics tend to get a bit tedious. Shakin' it loose has the fastest tempo on the album enhanced by good keyboards and guitar, though Kevin Cronin's lead vocals, strong throughout the rest of the album, simply don't cut it on this song. The album concludes with I wish you were there, a love song with good, strong vocals supported by a well-worked in guitar mix; this is surely one of the better works on the album.

Hi infidelity is an album permeated by love songs, for this is what Kevin Cronin's bewitching voice is best suited for, and he is well supported by Gary Richrath's guitar. However, there is an underlying sameness to all the songs on the album which tends to lead into somewhat monotonous listening. It will be interesting to see whether on their next album REO Speedwagon will continue in the mold laid out in Hi infidelity or whether they will expand their musical horizons. We can only wait and hope for the best from this group of up and coming musicians.

THE POSTMAN ALWAYS RINGS TWICE *

The 1981 version of The Postman Always Rings Twice is the fourth time James M. Cain's 1934 novel has been translated to screen. Lana Turner and John Garfield who starred in the 1946 version, would turn over in their graves if they saw this version, which is probably the sexiest. It stars Jack Nicholson, whose last good film was "One Flew Over The Cuckoo's Nest" (1975). Since then, his films "Going South" and "The Shining" have been below par. The leading lady is played by Jessica Lange, who starred in the 1976 version of "King Kong".

The story takes place in the 1930's the same decade that Nicholson's 1974 film "Chinatown" takes place. The only difference is that Chinatown is a far superior film. Nicholson plays a drifter who comes into town, looking for a job. He gets a job working for a Greek truck stop owner and falls for the owner's wife. The story didn't have much excitement to it. It may have been better if the story was rewritten for the 1980's. Dragging at a snail's pace, the story makes Nicholson and Lange look bad. I hope Nicholson who triumphed as Randle Patrick McMurphy in Cuckoo's Nest starts making films equally as good to the 1975 best picture as lately his career is going deeper into a hole and he is too good an actor to loose.

The only scenes that kept me from a deep slumber were the seduction scenes. Even these scenes had faults as they went too far in what they showed. I felt like I was watching one of Russ Meyer's oversexed "Vixen" movies. Because of these scenes Postman almost received an X-rating but narrowly avoided it. But, no matter how much sex director, Bob Rafelson (Five Easy Pieces) depicts, in the film it doesn't rise above the limp story. "The Postman Always Rings Twice" just doesn't deliver and would have done better if the film stayed in the dead letter office en route to theatres.

FINGERING THE FACTS WITH JOHNNY: THE BOOMTOWN RATS IN CONCERT

The Boomtown Rats returned to Boston late in February on their "Bongo Europa '81" tour, pushing Mondo Bongo, their new album on CPS records. To say that the Rats believe in audience participation is an understatement. By the end of the show, numbers of people from the audience had been on stage at one time or another, some invited and others not. After the show, I asked Bob Geldof, lead singer of the Rats, if this was a common scene at other gigs. His response was a simple, "Hey, if people want to dance, it's fine with us."

Geldof and percussionist Dave McHale began the show with "Mood Mambo," the title cut from the latest album, as they sat in front of a gold Boomtown Rats curtain which spanned the stage. Soon the curtain was opened, revealing the five remaining Rats in front of a black and white striped backdrop which continued onto the floor in the form of black and white wooden planks. Geldof yawned, turned up his collar, and swung into "Up All Night," another cut from Mondo Bongo. After that, it was all exuberance, enthusiasm, and frenzy, as the band put more energy into the next 85 minutes than anyone could ever hope for, touching on such cuts as "Rat Trap," "Having My Picture Taken," and "I Don't Like Mondays," a cut from The Fine Art of Surfacing, the Rats' best-selling album in the United States to date. ("Mondays" was one of the highlights of the show because of the emotion which the band put into it as they talked of John Lennon's death, an emotion which the audience found difficult to appreciate.) From the time Geldof invited members of the audience to join the band on stage "to help us twist," to the time the curtain was closed and several fans rushed the band, it was a show with more fervor on the part of both the band and the audience than I have seen in a while. The band seemed more than mildly amused as members of the audience invited themselves on stage to dance with the band. As one of the Rats put it, "The gigs are the only things that are enjoyable...the rest can be very boring."

With a concert as powerful as this one, one might begin to wonder why the Rats' newest album is not doing so well in the United States. Johnnie Fingers, the band's keyboardist, told me before the show that one reason is because "There isn't a place for the Boomtown Rats on American radio." He went on to say that there was a time when the band began questioning whether their music was adequate, but they soon determined that, as he put it, "The fault is with American radio, it's not with us."

The Boomtown Rats--powerful, talented, and still rising to the top. And, with concerts as vibrant as this one, The Rats will have no trouble staying right on the surface of things.

On his "English Mugs USA Tour" Elvis Costello has blessed Boston with yet another flawless concert. Although Elvis only played for ninety minutes, his show consisted of an incredible barrage of songs from his first five albums and most every song from his latest release, Trust, (not to mention a couple of songs unreleased in the US).

Costello's lyrics, about alienation, hate, and frustration, did not seem to matter to most of the crowd, who were busy with manic dancings on such songs as "Radio," "Goon Squad," and "Peace, Love, and Understanding." "Squeeze" proved to be the perfect back-up for Elvis, and the audience, many seeing "Squeeze" for the first time, roared for an encore.

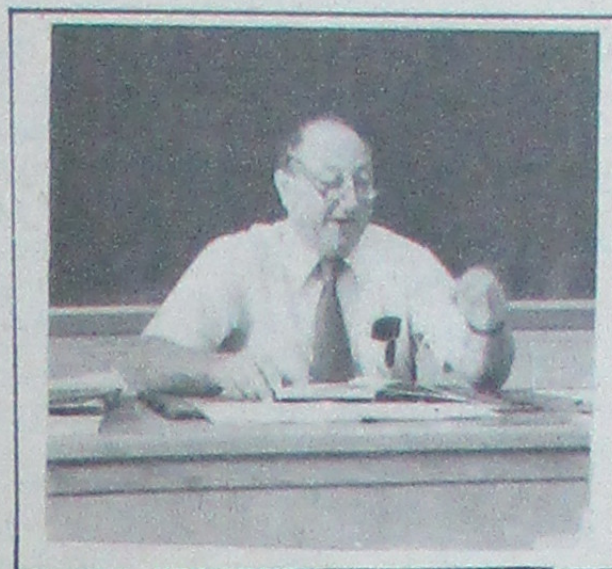
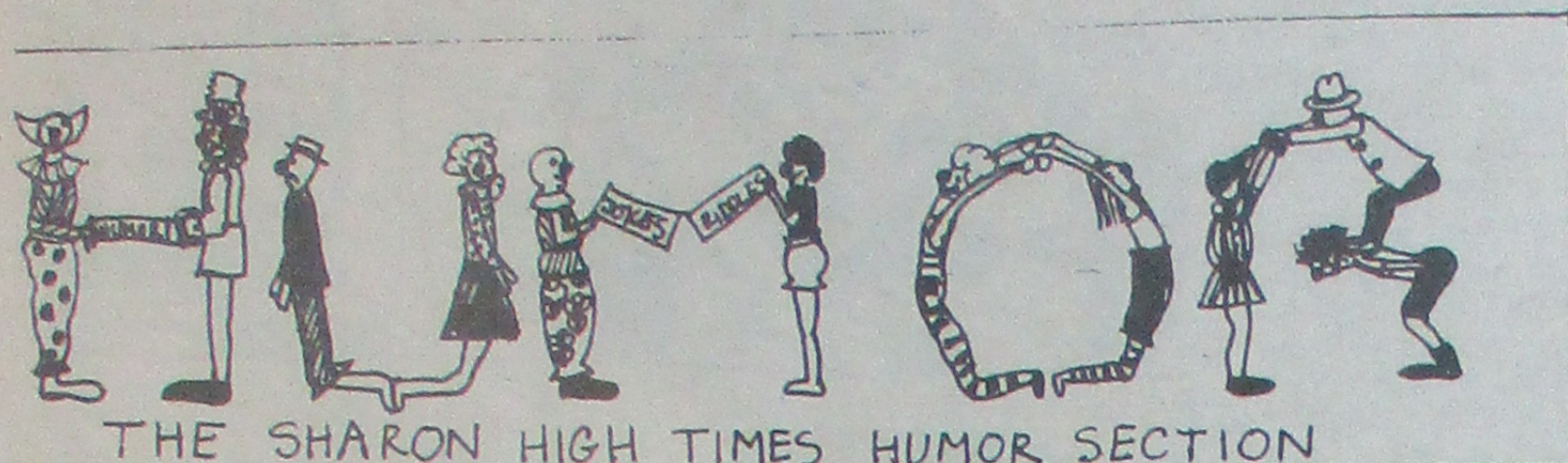

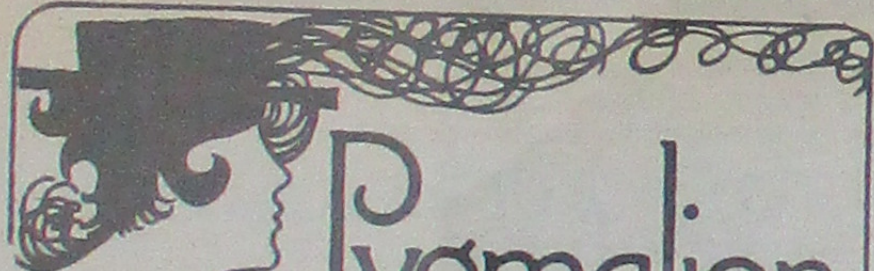
