THEFT IN SHARON HIGH SCHOOL



WHY WOULD ANYONE STEAL THIS MAN?

What was once only a relatively minor problem at Sharon High School has now escalated to the level of a major crisis. A recent Sharon High Times survey of 212 students reveals that a MAJORITY OF SHARON HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS HAVE BEEN ROBBED IN SCHOOL. If the Biblical injunction, "Theu Shalt not murder: were violated as often as "Thou shalt not steal," 55% of the student body--510 people--would now be dead... and another 5 innocent students would be murdered every day:

There is little that is not being stolen. Frequently mentioned were jewelry, locks, pens, and drugs. The two "most stolen" items, though-greatly surpassing every thing else-were articles of clothing and lunches. The instances of theft have become so widespread, in fact, that many students are afraid to deep even bag lunches in their lockers, preferring instead the locked locker of a friend.

This fear is understandable since, according to the survey, 91% of all thefts occur either in one's regular locker of one's gym locker. Nevertheless, only 60% lock their gym lockers and only 46% lock their regular lockers, while 21% lock neither. These figures are unexcusable, Based on a total student population of 925, the monstrous

amount of \$8290.00 worth of material has been stolen since these students! freshman years. For that amount, re-usable combination locks -- the most popular proposal for prevention of theft--couldb be puchased for 4166 students (based on 1.99 a lock) But, since only 925 locks are needed, the purchase could be made with \$6449 \$6449.25 left over. It might be argued that there isn't \$8290.00 to spend, and therefore, rather than keeping \$6449.25, the cast is actually \$1840.75 loss. But, is it better to not spend any money initially and lose \$8290.00 every four years, or spend \$1840.75 initially and cut the amount lost more than 91%? Obviously, the latter is far preferable, but the school might argue that the students are the ones losing the money and are therefore responsible for buying their own locks. This argument loses substance when it is school policy to have monitors police the halls and to pay people to give students detention because they talk in study halls. The presant schoolwide crackdown on every rule infraction should certainly include measures to prevent theft, the best of which is probable the issuing of locks to each

student, holding him responsible to replace the lock if it is lost. The protection afforded the students certainly justifies the one-time cost of locks by the administration.

Other methods suggested to prevent theft include hall monitoring, alarms in lockers, and stricter enforcement of rules. Punishments proposed for those accused of theft run the gamut: repayment of stolen goods, reporting theft to the police, suspension, detention, and the death penalty. By far the most popular proposal to deal with thieves is in-house suspension. (After all, who would want or be stupid enough to get in-house?")

But, often, ideas are stronger than the action.
Of those robbed, 19% had a good idea who the thief was.
The number of these IDENTIFIED THIEVES who were punished though, is an unbelievable "O". Obviously, there is something wrong with the present system.

Reinforcing the belief (although not so strongly) that the aurrent system of catching thieves needs revamping is the following information collected anonymously from self-accused robbers, who make up 18% of the school body. These students who steal on a regular basis say that only 21% of them have ever been caught, only one in five thieves. Stealing lunches, drugs, and clothing, these students cite hunger, and a "need" for what they steal as the main reasons for the grimes.

Theft in Sharon High School can no longer be ignored. Missing in action are everyghing from water fausets to bag lunches. In a student body of 925, the number of objects stolen just since September is frightening—seven hundred and thirty—seven.

When will the carnage stop?

SCHOOL POLICY ON THEFT

Very few cases of theft are reported each year; it is suspected that many more go unreported. Those that are reported are treated as the crime they are. The police are immediately called in and treat it as they would treat any theft. If, by some chance, the thief is caught in the act of committing the crime, he (she) is sent to the police and they handle the punishment.


There are two easy ways to deter thefts: if you see someone stealing something or have something stolen, report it to the office, and put locks on your lockers. There is not, nor has there ever been, a rule against having locks on lockers. As a matter of fact, they are encouraged highly by the office.

Some people wonder why locks are not supplied by the school. Mr. Stevenson has bee working on getting those locks ever since he began as principal. Each year he has put it in his budget proposal, but the school committee has never approved it.



UNCLE SAM IS CALLING ... WILL YOU ANSWER?

A senior male is faced with many decisions to be made this year: collegeplans, carger goals, what to do after graduation; however, an approaching his 18th birthday, he is yet faced with another decision to make: whether or not to register.

The purpose of registration is to build a pool of names and addresses from which Selective Service could draw in an emergency. By way of background, one of the basic underlying assumptions of the All-Volunteer Force concept was that the country should always maintain a stand-by Selective Service, with an on-going system of registeration. When the draft was ended in 1972, registration was in fact continued until suspended in 1975. Over the next few years, the mapabilities of Selective Service steadily declined to an unacceptable level, prompting a total revitalization which began in November 1979. This program—of which registration is a part—is de-

signed to return the Selective Service System to the readiness level required for an emergency back-up to our peace time volunteer armed forces. Other actions underway include the development of greatly improved computer support, and the development of a training program for potential draft board members.*

The Selective Service requires that all males register at any U. S. Post Office within 30 days of their 18th birthday if they are a) a citizen of the U. S. of b) an alien residing in the U. S. Failing to register is a violation of the Federal Law which could lead to a felony conviction with a maximum penalty of 5 years in prison and/or a \$10,000 fine.

We surveyed the senior males in Sharon High School on facts concerning registration and the draft and of those 18 year olds surveyed, the following information has been drawn:

The most popular branch of service for senior males who had not yet reached their 18th birthday was the air force, while the army, navy and the coast guard were tied for the second most popular branch.

of all the senior males polled, the majority stated that they had registered for fear of
violating the law and ending up in prison. On
obeying the draft request, again the majority
stated they would comply as it is required of
them by law while few expresses obeying the draft as a patriotic duty to protect they would
"obey a draft request to fight for freedom, but
not to support the government of El Salvedor or
other places irrelevant to the safety of the
U.S. or world."

One peculiar factor that should be noted of the 18 year olds who have not registered, 1/3 stated that they would obey a draft request.






SENIORS ON THE GO




VARSITY BASEBALL

Many of the 18 year olds polled stated that they were willing to go overseas to "fight for freedom;" yet they are not given freedom of choice in their own country as registration is

mandatory.

Isn't it hypocritical that these 18 year old males who are too young to drimk are old enough to kill?

HAVE WE BEEN PRESSED TOO FAR

Recently, the vulnerability of America's press corps has come to light.

Television coverage of the assassination attempt on President Ronald Reagan's life was widely criticized. They made many mistakes on that day, but the most blatent was obviously, the statement made by all three networks, that said the President's Press Secretary James Brady had died.

When a "breaking story" of the magnitude, of an assassination attempt occurs, all three networks cover the event live. Reporting an event live is one of the toughest Jobs for electronic journalists. A reporter does not have the time to check and double check his facts in that type

of situation. He performs his editing on the air in fromt of millions of Americans. It is nearly impossible to have a story on the air live and report it accurately. Often rumours appear on the air to fill space.

Chris Wallace, son of Mike Wallace of "60 Minutes" fame, almost put his career in jeopardy the day the President was shot. While reporting live from 'George Washington University Hospital', he told the audience that the President was in open-heart surgery. He had what he thought was an exclusive and it turned out only to be a rumour.

Most recently print journalism has come under much scrutiny.

Janet Cooke, former employee of The Washington Post, was the author of a bogus story that won a Pulitzer Prize, about an eight year old heroin addict in Washington D.C. At her former employment, The Washington Post, the prestige and credibility brought to the paper by Watergate was destroyed instantly by the scandal.

Ironically both Janet Cookes story and Watergate supposedly had anonymous sources involved. Both times the editor, Benjamin Bradlee, announced, after the story had come under heavy criticism, "The Washington Post stands by our reporter(s)"

The mystique of anonymous sources in investigative'r reporting was magnified by "Deep Throat" in the Watergate movie, "All The Presidents Men" in which Robert Redford and Dustin Hoffman portrayed Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein, the investigative reporter, we uncovered watergate.*

A lot can be learned from the Jane Cooke incident.

REOPEN LINKS?

STIR CRAZY (***)

For several weeks now when I have gone to the movies, I have seen previews of coming attractions. Stir Crazy was always among the movies previewed. This comedy movie, which stars Richard Pryor and Gene Wilder, looked like the kind of movie you would want to see when all you wanted

was a good laugh.

This movie starts right before Pryor and Wilder get fired from their jobs. Once fired, Wilder talks Pryor into leaving New York and going to California because both men are now free to go and do as they wish. Wilder picks California because he is a playwright looking for success. When they get to California, they take a job at a bank dressed up as chickens, so that they can pay their rent. A short time after they start work, two men dressed in the chicken suits rob the bank, and Pryor and Wilder are blamed for it and sent to jail. The remainder of the movie deals with their life in prison, and how they get out.

There were some very funny scenes in the movie. One day Wilder went up to a fellow prisoner, who was in for a series of murders and didn't talk to anyone, and tried to talk to him. He was quickly scared away, but it was very funny Pryor tried to have a tough self-image, but a queer man kept trying to be "friendly" with him.

I would recommend that people go and see this movie. It is a funny, very enjoyable movie to see if you just want to go to a movie to be entertained but don't want to worry about a heavy plot.

Eight years ago it was an idea, a dream. Even before Michael Cimino directed The Deer Hunter he wanted to bring to the screen a story of life in the 1890's in the days of land wars. Now \$40 million later, it must seem like a nighmare, a bad dream come true. In its original length Heaven's Gate was 3 hours and 39 minutes (not including a 15 minute intermission). In November 1980 the film opened in New York disasterous reviews and within a week pulled from the theaters. For the past five months Cimino has re-edited, re-dubbed, and re-scored, cutting and hour and a half of film to make a re-cut version of 2 hours and 27 minutes. Even before it had opened in April to the public it lost money, and will always be remembered as an expensive bomb. And now the bomb has finally exploded.

Heaven's Gate takes place in Johnson County Wyming in the 1890's. The main story is about an association of landowners who put out a deathlist on which 125 names are on, all of them foreigners who are believed to be crooks. The film reminds me of a sandwich. Like bread the film runs thick on unnecessary details and contains little meat, in this case the story line. Although the plot was introduced in the first half hour we don't see the conclusion until the last hour. In between we see a little boy's love for a camera and his big, expensive ideas Cimino leaves the scenes long and overplayed making Heaven's Gate into "Cimino's Folleys" in which masses of people are as confused as the stars. The film stars Kris Kritofferson, Chistopher Walken and Isabelle Huppert as Kristofferson's immigrant girlfriend. The acting was bad, with the stars showing no emotion for the characters. Kristofferson walked through the movie in a monotone and he would have done better to have stayed a singer instead of becoming an actor.

This is not the first time Cimino has overdone scenes, for in The Deer Hunter the wedding scenes lasted half a hour, but at least the scene had a beautiful church and overall was a nice half hour stretch. In Heaven's Gate the last half hour shows a war between the land owners and the immigrants. It was hard to keep up with everyone and I couldn't tell who was getting shot at. Even though it was the only action in the film it got boring, besides it was easy to predict the outcome.

After this film I start to wonder if Cimino is a showman rather than a true filmmaker. The photography was nothing special, it's only Montana. I don't think anything could compare to the beautiful French countryside in which Roman Polanski's <u>Tess</u> was filmed.

Films such as <u>Heavens Gate</u> and <u>Tess</u> don't have a large audience appeal, as they are aimed mostly at adults. I have doubts whether <u>Heaven's Gate</u> will click. I can only say thank God I didn't have to sit through the 3 1/2 hour version. If <u>Heaven's Gate</u> was such a sacred film, the boys at United Artist should have sacrificed it a long, long time ago.

THE FOOLS: HEAVY MENTAL



HUMAN SEXUAL RESPONSE: IN CONCERT

Amid a clamoring of cheers, whistles, and other uncontrolled ejaculations, Human Sexual Response took the stage at Boston's Paradise Theater, kicking off the show for the sold-out crowd---many of whom were under twenty, as this was one of the very rare "All Ages Admitted" shows at The Paradise, one of Boston's best clubs --- with "Guardian Angel," a cut from Figure 14, their debut album.

From there, The Humans, all of whom were wearing Donny and Marie print material fashioned into seven unique outfits --- from a dress to a bathing suit (this article of clothing showed the advanced workmanship which had gone into it, as Donny's mouth had been carefully lined up so that it appeared on some certain spot on singer Dini Lamot's body), outfits which, they later explained, they had all made themselves --- moved into "Dick and Jane," th thus following the order of cuts as it was on the album. The band soon found themselves faced with having to fill some dead time as they had to wait for drummer Malcom Travis' Hi-Hat to be replaced, and so The Humans' four singers (Larry Bangor, Casey Cameron, Windle Davis, and Lamot), began a discussion on Donny and Marie, and soon had the audience begging for a Donny and Marie commercial spoof, which the band was spared from performing as the Hi-Hat was fixed. It didn't take long for the vitality of the show to return, and it was even sparked to a higher level as the band moved into "What Does Sex Mean To Me?," one of the successful singles from Figure 14.

Throughout the rest of the show, The Humans went through every song that appears on their debut album, as well as a few cuts which they plan to record on their forthcoming album sometime this summer. Drummer Travis was so involved with his playing, and in such a deep level of concentration, that he seldom --- if ever --- looked up at the audience, but instead spent the eighty minutes of the show staring at his snare drum. Buitarist Rich Gilbert became so involved in the "improvisational and spiritual dancing" (as described by Cameron after the show). that, as the music compelled his body to try and dance across the stage, he more than once accidentally pulled

his cord from his guitar.

But the highlight of the show was clearly the singing combination of Cameron, Bangor, Lamot, and Davis, who at one time were an acappella country and western act that performed at parties in the Boston area. Their singing talents and their subsequent ability at harmonizing, as well as their stage presence and original and imrovisational dancing moves (mixed in with their syncopated ones), raised the crowd to high extremes of exultation and excitement

After the seventy-minute set and its subsequent single encore, as the band stood backstage reading notes from the crowd and deciding if they should return for yet another encore, the enthusiasm of the crowd quickly rose to a level that left The Humans with no choice other than to return, and so they walded on stage and plunged into "Public Alley 909," a song slated for a spot on their forthcoming album Unfourunately, the band's monitors blew just seconds into the song, and as the cocentration was on vocals, the band found it difficult to perform this

song that involved harmonies, as they could hear neither themselves not their fellow performers. This was yet another credit to The Humans, though, as they ended up performing a rather flawless rendition. (Singer Lamot proved his adaptability and ingenuity by leaving his spot on the stage and walking over to the edge, from where he could hear the house speakers and so could monitor his singing.)

The Loners, another Boston band, performed a rater monotonous set as opening act, and had trouble working the crowd up to "uncontrolled excitement," though by the end of their set they were on their way to arousing the audience. Highlight of their show was "Neighborhood Kids," a cut from their single that is now available in some Fastern Massachusetts record stores.

To add to the current popularity of some bands, record companies are digging up their old albums - the majority of which usually don't compare with he groups current material. is in a class all by themselves.

RUSH:

MOVING PICTURES

With the attainment of stardom in the music world harder and harder to acheive in an industry prederinated by legends, many groups must make changes to be accepted by the record-buying public. An increasing number of bands are tuning "pop" or "mainstream" to boast their sales and please their producers. This, unfortunately, makes others unhappy; these who have followed a band from its beginning, only to hear it drastically change its sound to appeal to the masses. Groups who have done this Journey, REO Speedwagon, and Styx, have lost one audience and gained another, to the dismay of their old fans and the attack of the critic's pens.

Rush was a group who refused to change. A Canadian trio, formed in the mid-70's, Rush broke through with "Fly By Night," the title track from their second album, and set the scene for heavy touring. With this, Rush established a loyal following -- a following Rush has never forgotten. Two albums later, Rush released 2112 (pronounced twenty-one-twelve); the title track a side-long song depicting its conflict with producers, who tried in vain to persuade Rush to change its sound -- to appeal to the masses.

Since 2112, Rush has put out a handful of albums, including "live" All the World's a Stage. each concept progressing to new heights, new sounds, new ideas. Airplay became more frequent, songs became known as "Closer to the Heart" and "The Spirit of Radio" joined "Flyby Night" as

the commonly heard Rush song.

With the release of Moving Pictures last February-an album that radio stations and the public have taken a liking to, Rush has ascended to the heights of superstardom. Listed in the top ten, Rush is being played extensively on "Mainsteam" stations like WCOZ, where previously

it was rarely heard.

Reach deep into the bag of sounds and pull out Moving Pictures. Listen to bassist/vocalist Geddy Lee weave and intertwine his complex basslines up the crescendos toa soaring climax... Hear Alex Lifeson belt out his power chords-some simple, some complex, some straight-on, some syncopated. Marvel at lyricistt/percussionist Neil Peart as he displays his bag of tricks with almost inhuman accuracy.

For Rush, Moving Pictures is another conquered plateau, another height attained chapter in the annals of Rush. The lyrics are deep. yet meaningful. "Limelight" is a view of stardom and the life which accompanies it: "I can't pretend a stranger is a long-an awaited friend." "Vital Signs," with its syncopated guitar riffs, is another look.at human habits. purely instrumental, shows how tight and together this band is, as it builds up height and momentum like a huge wave, then crashes down, hissing, and settles in a quiet but melodic lull. Many bands sing of love, Rush sings of Life.

Contrary to popular belief, Rockihnroll is not the Greg Kihn Band's debut album, but it is actually their fifth album in less than four years. This San Francisco based band has had some minor success with their four previous albums, but Rockihnroll has already well surpassed the minimal airplay which the others

Rockinnroll starts out as well as one could hope an album to, with three powerful and exciting pop tunes: "Valerie," "the Breakup Song (They don't write 'em)" and "Womankind." "The Breakup Song" has already made the exchange from progressive rock stations to top forty rock stations, and definately makes a heavy impression on its listeners, brain washing them with its repetitive, cathcy refrain: "We had brocken up for good just an hour before, ah-aa-ah-a-a-a-ahh, Now I'm starin' at their bodies as they dance across the floor, ah-aa-a-ah a-a ahh---They don't write 'em like that anymore!" (Yes-Thatsthe one you've been trying to sing for the past few weeks!) first side. On the whole, Rockinnroll is an outstanding collection of pop-rock tunes, and Kihn and his band deserve the commercial success they'll probably get from this winner.




